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TVA Income Nets \$25,096,000 In Year

A net income of \$25,096,000 on its power operations during the fiscal year ended last June 30 is reported by the Tennessee Valley Authority in its financial statement for the 1952 fiscal year. This net income was realized on gross revenues of \$95 million from sales of 20 billion kilowatt hours of electricity. A return of 4.7 percent was earned on the average net power investment of \$555 million.

TVA's other operations—navigation, flood control, fertilizer and munitions development, and the development of the agricultural, forest, and other resources of the region—were carried out for a net expense of \$5,618,000.

At the year's end TVA had total assets of \$1,410,314,000, an increase of a quarter billion dollars from the previous June 30. The net investment in plant and equipment in service and under construction increased from \$960,498,000 to \$1,170,105,000. Power plant in use increased by about \$100 million, representing principally the cost of additional generating capacity which was increased from 3,181,000 on June 30, 1951, to 3,960,000 kilowatts on June 30, 1952. (The installed capacity is slightly more than 4,200,000 kilowatts today.)

Total funds available to TVA for the 1952 fiscal year amounted to \$291,225,000, including Congressional appropriations of \$238,390,000. About \$229 million of this sum was expended for new construction, with steam plant construction accounting for almost \$148 million. TVA redeemed \$5,000,000 of its outstanding bonds during the year and paid an additional \$11,000,000 into the general fund of the U. S. Treasury.
