

The Town of Andrews, with its ome 1,6000 residents, now biasts a water system that would amply service a town three times its size, after a year-long re-vamping ins the Andrews water supply system has been completed.

The \$115,000 project was figure ed by bonds after being voted in September 1952, by the town obsiscil. Construction and repairs began January 31, 1952, and the new gysm has been completed and in boeration for about two months

A new dam, holding one and a quarter million gallons of water was constructed at the headway er of Beaver Creek, abou miles from town, and abo mile below the old dam. The modern new concrete dam was built by the William B. Dillard Construction Company of Sylva.

The new dam takes in an a tional 400 acres, making the total watershed about 1200 acres, Claude Watson, town clerk said.


#### State Prexy Some 40 beginners reported to- Is Guest Here
