An apparently high voltage Murphy Power Board met Friday and in quick order elected itself a chairman, appointed a superintendent, hired a part time secretary and gave present employees of the Electric Department a vote of confidence.

Frank Forsyth, appointed in the newly passed General Assembly act as a six year member of the Power Board, was elected chairman of the board.

"Buster" Bayless was retained as superintendent of the electric department and Fred Derryberry was kept on as foreman. All other employees were kept with any changes in salaries and wages to be made after further study by the board.

The group voted to schedule a full study of the pay, sick leave, vacations and other factors pertaining to employees of the electric department.

Next meeting of the Murphy Power Board was set for 7 p. m. Thursday May 7. The panel has invited TVA and electrical engineers to the meeting to discuss the Murphy power system.
