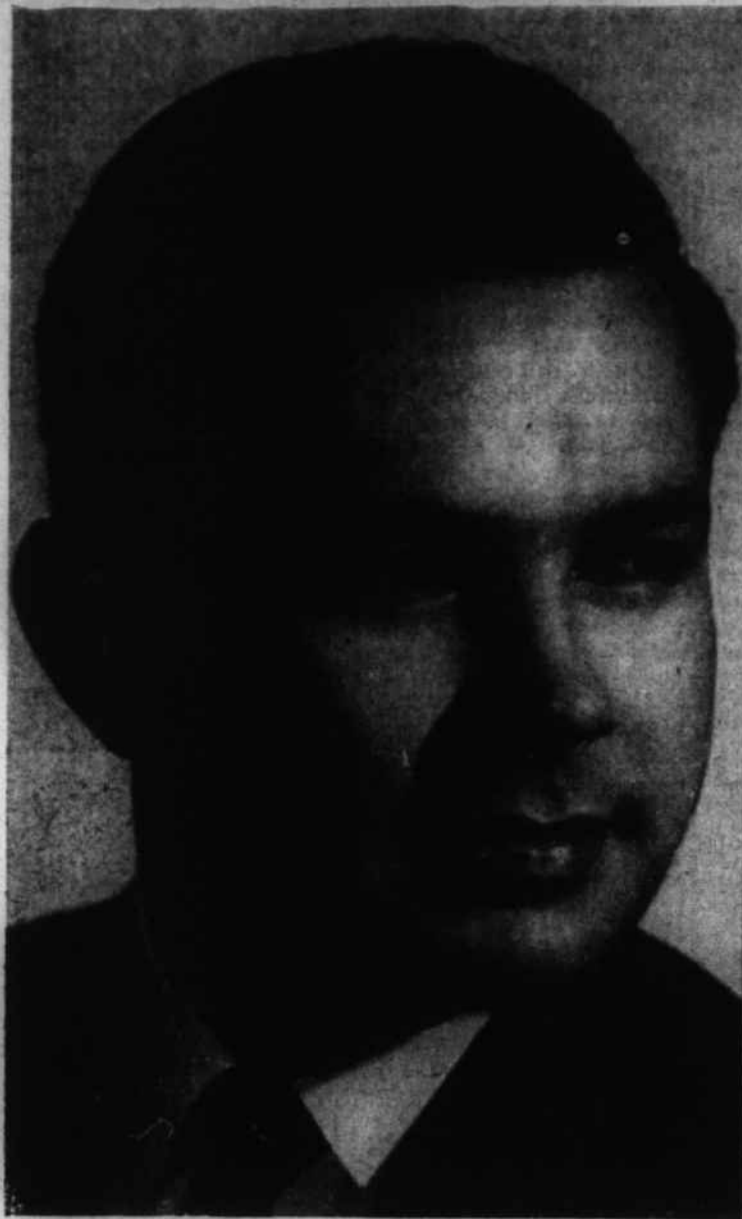


Sings Here Sunday
