**Worm Reduction** Is Explained

ematode population of their fields at least one-fourth by turning the with some other source of Vitamin roots of this year's tobacco plants out to the sun to dry, according to okee county agent for the N. C. plant disease specialists.

Howard Garriss, plant pathology specialist for the N. C. State College Agricultural Extension Service, says it has been known for many years that by exposing tobacco roots to air and sunlight the farmer can destroy large numbers of root knot and meadow nemato-

He adds, however, that man's North Carolina farmers fail to do this important job.

To be effective, Garriss says, the tobacco stalks ought to be cut and the roots turned out toward the sun soon after harvest. Many flelds of tobacco stalks are still standing, says Garriss, which means that nematode populations are still building up, this will make it more difficult for farmers to control them next year.

Corn Fed Animals Need Vitamin "A"

Tar Heel farmers can reduce the protein and energy in animal feed, but it should be supplemented A, according to G. H. Farley, Cher-State College Agricultural Extension Service.

Recent tests show that stored corn is not a dependable source of important Vitamin A, so essential in maintaining the health of livestock. Green forage is one of the best sources of Vitamin A, accordnot available, alafa leaf meal or any leafy hay, especially alafa hay, can be substituted to supply this important food element.

He adds that it makes no difference whether the fields have been fumigated, such treatments never kill all the nematodes present.

Regardless of what crop is planted following tobacco the nematodes can still do a lot of damage, particurly to cotton, corn or pea-

Garriss says the best method of getting the roots out of the ground is to plow them out with a turning

Then let them dry for four or five days. A second treatment with a light harrow will bring out more roots. Then plant a cover crop.
