Murphy's first play from scrimmage Eddie "Moody" Elliott, half-back break-away artist, dashed 40 yards to set up the first touchdown. Three plays later Tommy Gentry bowled over for the score. Elliott kicked the extra point and Murphy led 7-0.

In the second quarter Tommy Gentry pulled in a Cherokee fourth down kick and wormed his way 37 yards downfield. Several plays later Gentry again scored. Elliott's pat. attempt was blocked, and the half time score was 19-0.

In the third quarter Gentry again galloped about 35 yards on a Cherokee punt to set up another touchdown. Eddie Elliott scored, but Murphy was penalized and the t. d. was called back. On the next play Murphy fullback, Holt Palmer, bulled his way 20 yards for another score. However it was called back.

Finally several plays later Elliott pushed over a score. Elliott's

kick attempt was low. Murphy led 19-0.
Elliott's amazing kicks kept the Indians deep in their own territory, and the bulwarks of the Murphy defense kept them pinned most of the time.

In the fourth quarter Cherokee put up their only glimpse of power as they drove 75 yards on 5 straight first downs for a score. John Standing Deer pitched the score to Tom Whaneeta. The attempt at the extra point was foiled.

Shortly after that the game ended with Murphy still in control of the pigskin.

Outstanding on Murphy's defensive platoon were Ralph Almond a tough guard, and James Carroll, the always dependable linebacker. Elliott's 42 yard kicking average also proved important. One of Elliott's kicks covered more than 55 yards.

Up until the fourth quarter the remarkable Murphy defense had yielded only one first down to the Indians while the Murphy offense more than doubled that of Cherokee.
