 The Andrews Wildcats, in a display of good running, reverses, pitchouts and hidden ball plays, which had even the officials fooled at times, dazed the Robbinsville Blue Devils 26-0 Friday Night in Robbinsville.

The Wildcats took command early in the first period and after a 40 yard march to Robbinsville 10, Dean Dockery went thru the Blue Devils line to score. The Cats failed to make the extra point. Andrews took over the ball again after holding the Blue Devils and

forcing them to kick, Raxter and Holland reeled off yardage to the Robbinsville 5, where C. F. Myers took a pitchout and raced to pay-dirt for the second TD for the Wildcats. Dockery charged thru the line for the extra point.

In the second period Robbinsville was again forced to kick from the mid-field, Cooper took the ball on his own 20, faked a handoff and ran it back to the Blue Devils. 45 seconds later Johnny Raxter running brilliantly almost broke into the clear but was hauled down on the Robbinsville 20 yd. line.

The wildcats clawed their way to the 4 with Jimmy Holland accounting for much of the yardage. Holland skirted across for the third Andrews score. Andrews was again threatening after a sustained drive placed the Wildcats within a few feet of the Robbinsville goal as the half ended.

The fourth Andrews score came in the third period after some very fine running on the part of Jimmy Holland, who carried from the 4th for the final score. Bob Cooper carried for the extra point.

The Andrews line did an excellent job of stopping the Robbinsville running and passing attacks and only in the last few minutes of play did the Blue Devils drive within scoring range of the Andrews, goal only to have their hopes dashed by the stubborn Wildcats defense.

The Andrews fans got a look at some of Coach Hamilton's reserve talent in the person of Lloyd (little man) Derberry, who substituted at the quarterback post in the final period.
