

Cherokee Co. Cattle Be Tested For Bangs Disease

Cherokee County, which is one of the first counties in North Carolina to go on the Accelerated Brucellosis Program (Bangs disease), sponsored by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, has a very low rate of the disease according to Dr. R. M. Becton, government veterinarian.

Nearly half of the cattle of the County have been tested and out

those tested there was only one one hundredth per cent that had bangs. Each farmer will have an opportunity to have his cows tested free of charge.

Dr. A. J. Headrick, the local veterinarian, is assisting in the program. He is systematically testing all of the cattle in a community before moving on into another community, and eventually all cattle in
