Nursery Be Held During Course

A children's nursery will be held at the Campbell Folk School, Brasstown, for the children of mothers attending the Home Nursing Course, to be held Oct. 3-8.

Sponsored by the Red Cross, the Home Nursing Course will be taught each afternoon for two hours by Miss Eva Hensley and Mrs. Oran Witt. Both instructors received their training in a 30-hour Home Nursing Course last April.

Creative play materials which can be made at home will be included in the nursery program. Pre-school children will have an opportunity to play together as well as to enjoy various types of toys and play activities.

Miss Susan Swartz, Antioch College student currently working at the Folk School, will supervise the nursery. Each day one mother will assist Miss Swartz. A charge of 25 cents for the week will be asked to purchase crayons, paper, Graham crackers, and other supplies to be used during the week with the children.

All interested women are invited to participate in this Home Nursing Course. Young mothers are especially urged to come and bring their children to enjoy the pre-school nursery, while the mothers learn practical and improved methods of home nursing.

The first class and nursery period will be Monday, Oct. 3, at 1:30 p. m. at the Folk School.
