City Board Okays Paving On Five Streets In Murphy

The Murphy City Board approved paving contracts on five more streets at a special meeting at City Hall Monday night held for that

The paving will be done by the Charles Construction Company of Andrews and work will begin in the near future, according to Charles Johnson, city clerk.

Streets to be paved are: Sales Streets for a distance of 285 feet to be paved 16 feet wide.

Mauney Street for a distance of 250 feet from Jimmy Howse east corner to Lelia Dickey property and to be paved 16 feet wide.

Springdale Street from Cherry to Bault and to be paved 16 feet wide. Glenwood Street to be paved 16

Willow Street for a distance of 278 feet and to be paved 16 feet

Contracts on these five streets brings the total to eleven approved by the City Board for paving this

The other six, which were approved on July 1, are Blumenthal, Westmoreland, Boulevard, Cherry, Blumenthal and Wofford.

County Commission Explains Reason State in June, will give talks on For Abandoning Tax Increase Idea

The County Commissioners deem it expedient to publicly explain the reason for abandoning the idea of increasing the value of real estate in the County thirty (30%) per cent across

First, the State Board of Assessment appraises and assesses all property of railroads and other public utilities. It was the intention of the Board of Commissioners to raise the value of all real estate thirty (30%) per cent and to lower the tax rate, which would have resulted in the railroads and other public utilities paying less and the citizens and real estate owners paying more taxes. This would manifestly be unjust discrimination in favor of railroads and other public utilities.

· Also, this plan would have resulted in corporations owning mostly personal property paying less taxes than would have otherwise been the case.

After a careful investigation and consideration, it was found that this plan would have resulted in no great increase in the amount of tax collections. There was also violent opposition by a large number of tax payers. On the whole, it was not thought best to adopt the plan.
