The FHA said the new down payment schedule is: 3 per cent on the first \$10,000; 15 per cent on the next \$6,000, and 30 per cent on amounts over \$16,000.

An example: a home costing \$10,000, the minimum down payment will be \$300. This is \$400 less than under the old schedule.
