Of the nearly $\$ 18$ million earned
by North Carolina farmers by their participation in the 1057 Soll their program $\$ 16,257,751$ has already offices, according to local ASC Walker, chairman of the ASC state committee.
The 1957 Soil Bank program con-
sisted of two parts sisted of two parts, the Soil Bank Acreage Reserve and the Soil Bank Conservation Reserve. Under the
acreage reserve phase, which serves to reduce plantings of "basie" crops, payments were earned in
1957 totaling crops, payments were earned in
1957 totaling $\$ 17,200,000$. Of that amount all but $\$ 1,143,000$ is now in
the hands of the hands of participating farmera.
Walker explained Walker explained that the con-
servation reserve part of the program deals not with allotment
chops, but with other cash crops The conservation reserve serves to reduce plantings of these "other cash crops" and also requires pro-
