NOTICE OF SALE OF BONDS \$40,000

TOWN OF MURPHY, NORTH CAROLINA ELECTRIC SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS

Sealed bids will be received until 11 o'clock, A. M., Eastern Standard Time, December 17, 1957, by the undersigned at its office in the City of Raleigh, North Carolina, for \$40,000 Electric System Revenue Bonds of the Town of Murphy, North Carolina, dated December 1, 1957 and maturing annually on December 1, \$8,000 1958 to 1962, inclusive, without option of prior payment. There will be no auction. Denomination \$1,000; principal and semiannual (J and D 1) interest payable in lawful money at The Hanover Bank in New York City; coupon bonds registerable as to principal only; delivery on or about January 6, 1958, at place of purchaser's choice.

The bonds are to be issued pursuant to The Revenue Bond Act of 1935, as amended, and Chapter 894, Session Laws of 1957, and a resolution duly adopted by the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Murphy on December 3, 1957, for the purpose of financing the cost of erecting and equipping, as a part of the electric system of the Town, a building to provide offices and facilities for the Town of Murphy Electric Power Board. The bonds are not a debt of the Town but are payable solely from the revenues derived from the operation of its electric system, such payment being secured by a pledge of revenues adequate to pay the principal and interest of the bonds, which pledge constitutes a first charge on the revenues of such electric system, subject only to payment of expenses of operations and maintenance as provided in the authorizing resolution. Additional bonds of equal standing with the bonds of this issue may be issued, but only for the purposes and upon the terms and conditions set forth in the authorizing resolution. Further information and a copy of the authorizing resolution may be obtained from the undersigned upon request.

Bidders are requested to name the interest rate or rates, not exceeding 6% per annum in multiples of 1/4 of 1%. Each bid may name one rate for a part of the bonds having the earliest maturities and another rate for the balance, but no bid may name more than two rates and each bidder must specify in his bid the amount of bonds of each rate. The bonds will be awarded at not less than par and accrued interest to the bidder offering to purchase the bonds at the lowest interest cost to the Town, such cost to be determined by deducting the total amount of the premium bid from the aggregate amount of interest upon all of the bonds until their respective maturities. No bid for less than all of the bonds will be entertained.

Each bid must be submitted on a form to be furnished by the undersigned, must be enclosed in a sealed envelope marked "Bid for Bonds," and must be accompanied by a certified check upon an incorporated bank or trust company, payable unconditionally to the order of the State Treasurer of North

Carolina for \$900. The right to reject all bids is reserved. The approving opinion of Reed, Hoyt, Washburn & McCarthy, New York City, will be furnished the purchaser.
