There will be a Story Hour at the Murphy Carnegie Library Saturday morning at 10.

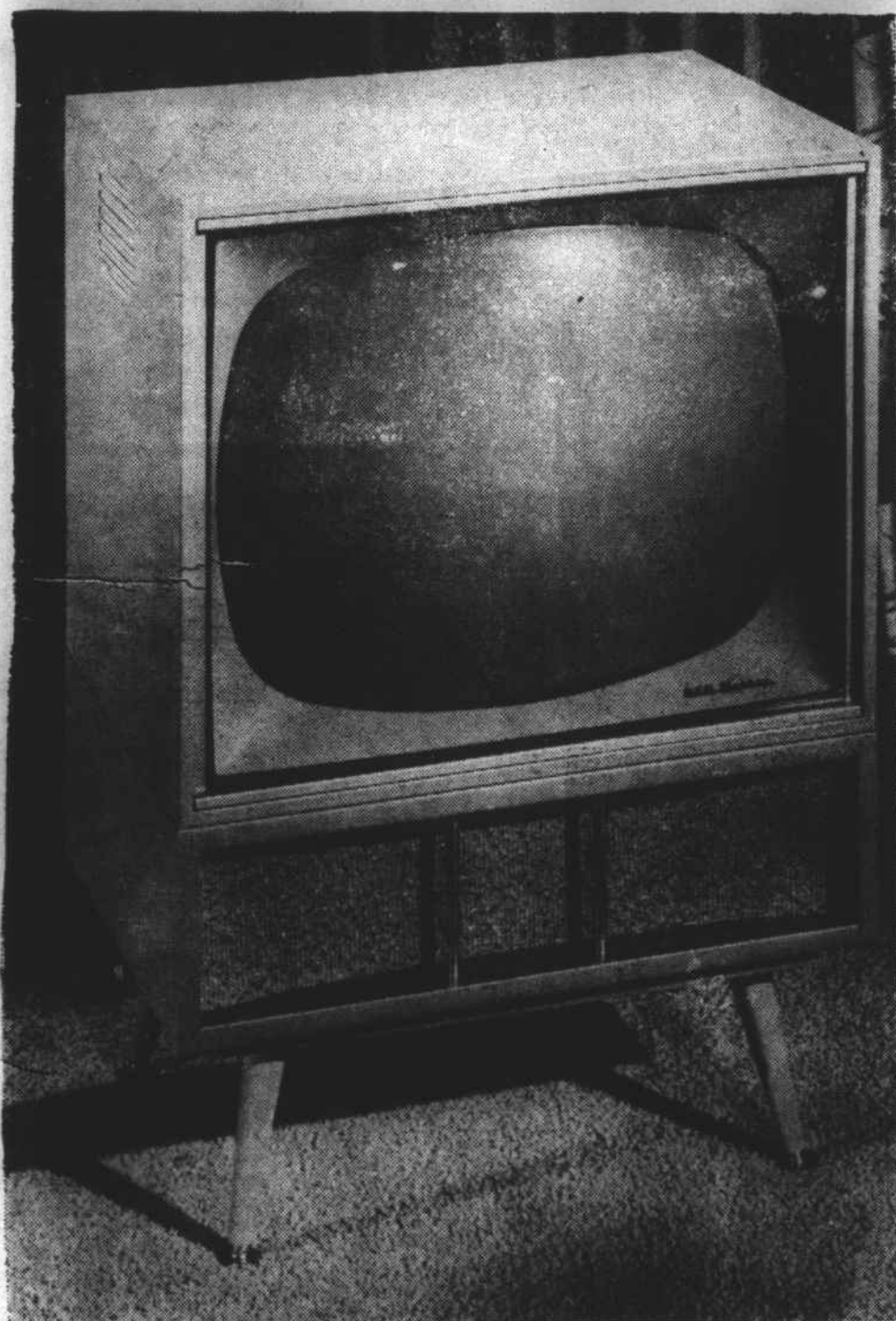
