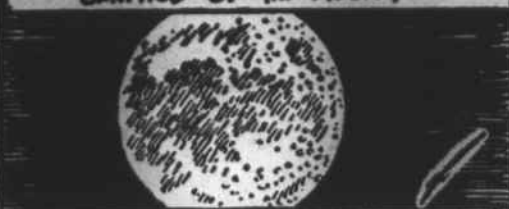

WHAT ARE THE PRIMARY HUMAN EMOTIONS?



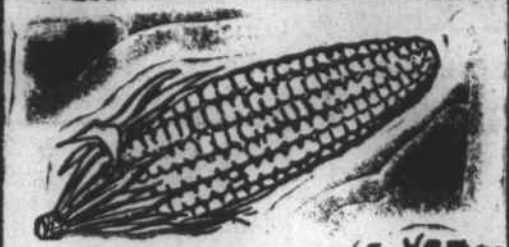

QUESTION: What new crop varieties have been released recently by the N. C. Agricultural Experiment Station?

ANSWER: Two new cucumber varieties, each resistant to both downy mildew and scab diseases, have been released during the past year. They are Fletcher and Ashe. Both are fresh market, or slicer types. Dearing, a self-fertile grape adaptable to all the Southern states, was recently released. And seed of Potomac, a new orchard grass, will be available to farmers for the first time this summer. It has superior rust resistance, leafiness and good qualities of persistence.

A good farm marketing situation exists when there is large volume, high quality products, and dependable supply.

QUESTION: How should I thin my pines?

ANSWER: Loblolly and shortleaf pines, that are to be thinned every three to five years, should be spaced so three to four feet of space is left between crown (top) edges. In stands 15 years of age the three-foot crown spacing usually leaves from 350 to 400 trees per acre.

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
