Marble Airman Assigned To Pope AF Base

Technical Sergeant Marion L. Rogers, of Marble, N. C., has arrived at Pope Air Force Base for assignment as an inventory and management supervisor with the 464th Supply Squadron.

The 30-year-old airman has been a member of the Air Force since June 1947, and he came to Pope following a three-year overseas tour in France with duty at Dreux and Laon air bases.

T. Sgt. Rogers is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John A. Rogers, Marble Route 1, and he attended Murphy High School. He was employed with the Columbia Marble Co., Marble, before entering service.

He and his wife, Muriel, are the parents of two daughters, Nancy L., 8, and Sharon V., 5.

Pope Air Force Base, where T. Sgt. Rogers is now serving, is home of the 464th Troop Carrier Wing (Assault), a unit of the Tactical Air Command's Ninth Air Force. The North Carolina Education Magazine has received the top rating in appearance, readability, and content by O. M. Forkert and Associates of Chicago, nationally known consultants in typography and layout.

The journal, publication of the North Carolina Education Association, is issued monthly except June, July, and August and has more than 30,000 subscribers.

The editor of the publication is Dr. W. Amos Abrams and the advertising manager is John G. Bikle, T. S. Ferree, Jr., consultant artist, Stearns Engravers, cuts and engravings, and Edwards and Broughton, printers, round out the group officially charged with the publication of the magazine.

The evaluation by the Forkert organization scored all ratings as "Excellent," without exception, for the 48 categories rated. Rated were covers, placement and quality of advertising, table of contents page, attention value and readability, photographs, cartoons and art work, and distinctive character and appeal.

Typical of the comments by Forkert was the statement that the "State Park series, the Education Features, Editorials, and Departmental Features are still tops."

Bikle has been associated with the magazine for 29 years and Dr. Abrams has served as editor for 13 years. The magazine has been printed for 52 years of the NCEA's 101 year existence and has long been considered a leader in its field.

Peaches Never Tasted So Good!



Juicy and full of peach flavor, this miracle pie will hit the spot tonight. The delectable fresh peaches in the filling are sweetened and thickened to perfection with vanilla pudding and pie filling so that every bite of this heavenly pie retains all the natural fruit flavor and color. So easy to make on top of the range, the filling is prepared in minutes, cooled and spooned into a baked pie shell.

- Fresh Peach Miracle Pie**
- 2 cups diced fresh fully ripe peaches (5 to 6 peaches)
 - 1/4 cup sugar
 - 1 1/4 cups water
 - 1 package vanilla pudding and pie filling
 - 1/4 teaspoon salt
 - 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
 - 2 teaspoons lemon juice
 - 1 tablespoon butter
 - 1/2 teaspoon almond extract
 - 1 baked 8-inch pie shell, cooled

Combine peaches, sugar, and 1 cup of the water in a saucepan. Bring to a boil. Meanwhile, combine pudding mix, salt, nutmeg, lemon juice, and remaining 1/4 cup water. Stir to form a smooth paste. Add to boiling fruit, stirring to blend. Then cook and stir until mixture comes to a full boil.

Remove from heat and add butter and almond extract. Cool 5 minutes. Pour into pie shell. Let stand about 4 hours, or until firm. Serve with sweetened whipped cream and additional sweetened sliced peaches, if desired.
