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Soil Conservation NEWS

J. M. Allen, near Isabella, Tennessee, has established some of the best pasture that I have seen lately. The pasture is on a steep hillside from which most of the topsoil was taken to build a dam for a fish pond. After the dam was finished, Mont covered the area with litter from his chicken houses, spread lime and commercial fertilizer and then disked fescue and ladino clover seed into the soil. He got a complete stand and now is able to graze several cattle per acre on what was a very poor site for pasture until Mont went to work on it.

Mont discovered a strange grass growing on his farm for the first time this summer. He says that he had never seen the grass before and doesn't know how it got on his farm. The grass has been identified by the Plant Materials Specialist with the Soil Conservation Service as Woodreed grass. It is native to all the southeastern states but is not very common. The seed from the patch on the Allen farm is being gathered and will be planted next spring.

The open ditching which Roy Wells had done on his farm near Ebenezer has paid off not only for Roy but for his neighbors, Frank McDonald as well. Franks pasture stood in water most of the time before the ditch was dug on the Wells farm. Since the land below has been drained, Frank no longer is bothered with the water standing on his land.

William Norman plans to combine an acre of sericea lespedeza which he planted two years ago on a sandy field on the Harshaw farm. The sericea has grown so well, and made such high quality hay, that William plans to seed the rest of the five acre field next spring to sericea. He says that the sericea is the first thing he has seen grow on this sandy field that made a good crop of hay.

Neil Barnes Is AAUW Guest Speaker
