**Why Do Citizens Take Their Business Elsewhere?**

W. D. Ragsdale of the A & P store brought this article from The Springfield Sun to the attention of The Scout.

According to an ancient ballad, for want of a nail a kingdom was lost.

We might paraphrase the statement by declaring that because of the right kind of newspaper advertising much local business goes elsewhere.

It has been pointed out time and time again that chief competitors of most retail merchants come from metropolitan centers rather than from local competition.

Granting this to be true, why do local folk drive sixty or more than one hundred miles to do their shopping for wearing apparel and household needs?

The answer is found in large and attractive newspaper advertisements that appear in metropolitan newspapers and inadequate advertising by local merchants.

It is often true that persons who drive long distances to do their shopping later find the same items in their home town at a lower price. Had they read about such merchandise in a neat and attractive advertisement in their home town newspaper, they and the local merchant would have profited.

The dearest spot in any community, the cemetery, is the least advertised. Everyone knows the cemetery is there but few frequent the place. Conversely, many folk know we have retail merchants in Springfield but because of the fact they do not advertise their merchandise consistently they go to centers where wanted merchandise is advertised. Where their patronage is solicited in appealing printed elsewhere.

Blame for the failure of home folk to patronize local merchants can be placed upon the retailers themselves, not the customer, and it is a pleasure to offer to local merchants Kentucky's outstanding advertising medium, The Springfield Sun, where layouts are theirs for the asking; where assistance planning an advertising campaign is available at all times.
