Sealed bids will be received at Murphy, North Carolina, until 2:00 p.m. EST on the 9th day of November, 1959, at which time and place the office of the Town Clerk of they will be publicly opened and read for the purchase, cutting and removal of all designated sawtimber trees upon the timber sale area of approximately 600 acres lying within the watershed of the Town of Murphy located on the headwaters of Marble Creek in Cherokee County, North Carolina, and for the construction of fire control access roads entering and across the timber sale area.

Soil Conservation NEWS

Harvesting corn on the Ed Wood farm at Andrews is well under way now by Sam Ward and Joe Maxwell. It is doubtful if a better crop of corn has ever been grown in Cherokee County than they are gathering now, and it is almost certain that no one farm in the county has ever produced as much corn.

Only a small portion of the total acreage has been gathered so far but the portion that has been gathered has averaged cost 120 bushels per acre. Production on such a scale as this requires good management from land preparation to harvesting. The crop being gathered now prove that Ward and Maxwell have given the proper attention to their crop for its entire growing period.

The corn picker that is being used to harvest the corn is a sight in itself. The machine pulls, shucks, shells and cleans the corn from two rows at the time. The shelled corn is stored in a bin right on the picker until the bin is full. Many of you have probably seen the large storage bins into which the corn is then transferred for drying until it is used or sold.

When 120 bushels of corn is produced on one acre of land, it is a sure thing that the cost per bushel is much smaller than when only one acre is higher for the high yields of grain produced. The farmer who still plants open-pollinated varieties, in very wide rows, and with the stalks two feet or more apart in the row is doing a lot of extra work for the little corn that he will harvest for his efforts.

Soil Conservation NEWS
