

Protestant Churches Join In Special Service Sunday

Various ministers will speak of different phases of prayer and lead the congregation in a prayer of the nature treated in a union service of Protestant churches at 7:30 Sunday night at First Baptist Church.

A joint choir from participating churches will sing, and the offering taken be placed in the inter-church charity fund.

The Rev. Alex B. Hanson of Episcopal Church of the Messiah is to treat of the prayer of confession; the Rev. J. Alton Harris, host pastor, the prayer of supplication; the Rev. Robert A. Potter of the Presbyterian Church, prayer of intercession; and the

Elliott, retired Methodist minister, also taking part in the service. The choir will sing "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name" (Diadem).

Between brief messages and prayers of the ministers the congregation will sing appropriate hymns, with the choir leading. Jimmy Kinzey will be at the organ.

J. D. Larkins, N.C. Governor Candidate

RALEIGH, Jan. 20 — John D. Larkins Jr. opened his campaign for governor here Jan. 20 with an official declaration of his candidacy.

Larkins set the stage for the forthcoming campaign by offering a program based "on the need to raise the income level of the people of this state."

"At this point in the progress of North Carolina," Larkins said, "nothing is more important than raising the income level of our people. The problems of our state government are largely money problems."

"Consider the recent cut made in welfare aid to our aged and our sick. Consider the needs of our schools and the very pressing need for increasing the pay of our teachers and highway and state employees."

"Consider the very great need to improve our highway system and to help our farmers increase their income."

"Consider the need to bolster our prison system and thus protect the citizens of this state from escapees. Consider the need to help our cities and towns with their slum clearance problems."

"These are money problems, and they must be met by raising the income level of the people of this state. Additional taxable income will mean a more equitable distribution of the financial burdens of state government."

"North Carolina must continue her drive toward industrialization. It is my feeling that we must expand this drive by strengthening our industry-hunting division."

"Industry will provide more jobs, and this is the key that will unlock the solutions to our money problems in many vital fields."

Larkins also noted his 25 years of government experience in North Carolina. During that time he has been in nine sessions of the State Senate, on each of the Senate's 100 standing committees, president pro tempore of the Senate at the age of 32, twice chairman of the Senate Appropriations Committee, and twice chairman of the Governor's Advisory Budget Commission and Board of Awards.

Larkins has been chairman of the State Democratic Party and at present is Democratic national committeeman from North Carolina.

He had this to say about the issues mentioned in the announcement:

Orphans Change

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — Modern child welfare work is more concerned with youngsters from broken homes than with orphans, says a prominent Baptist child care worker.

"We changed the name of our institution from Baptist Orphans' Home to Baptist Children's Home because there are very few out-right orphans in the home today," says H. Truman Maxey.

Maxey is executive director of the Child Care Department of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma which operates the Baptist Children's Home in Oklahoma City.

"There was a time," he says, "when a child placed in an orphan's home could expect to spend his or her childhood there. Today, most children placed in children's home stay there only a few years or less."

C. V. Henkel To Run For Lt. Governor

Statesville — Veteran Democratic Senator C. V. Henkel, merchant, farmer and former manufacturer, has formally announced his candidacy for Lieutenant Governor. For four consecutive terms he has represented the 25th senatorial district, composed of Iredell, Catawba and Lincoln Counties.

Senator Henkel long has been prominent in Democratic affairs at all levels, serving from precinct chairman to finance director of the statewide party.

During all four terms in the legislature, Senator Henkel has served on the Committee on Conservation and Development, carrying out a life-long interest in the conservation of natural resources and industrial development. He twice served as chairman of this committee, an office he now holds.

Henkel's committee assignments during the last four terms include: Chairman of Conservation and Development, Chairman of Election Laws and Senatorial Districts, Vice Chairman of Appropriations, Vice Chairman of Public Health, Membership on Agriculture, Finance, Education, Banks and Currency, State Government, Insurance, Manufacturing, Labor and Commerce, Rules, University Trustees, Veterans and Military Affairs.

He attended Statesville Public Schools, Woodberry Forest and the University of North Carolina. In 1944 he was married to the former Marguerite Nunan. He is a member of Trinity Episcopal Church, Statesville, and is active in civic and community affairs both in Statesville and Blowing Rock.

J. A. Davidson Advises Area Veterans

John A. Davidson, District Officer, N. C. Veterans Commission advises all VA Pension recipients who have received Annual Income Questionnaire Cards from the Regional Office to properly complete these cards and return them to the originating office promptly. Failure to return these cards will result in discontinuance of monthly benefits.

These income questionnaires have nothing to do with the new pension law, Public Law 86-211 which becomes effective July 1, 1960. Information on this new law is available from the N. C. Veterans Commission office and leaflets will be mailed to all non-service connected pension recipients in the near future.

N. C. Veterans Commission office will be glad to explain the type of income which must be reported and will assist all claimants in properly completing and returning these forms. A proper record will also be made and filed for the claimant's protection and future reference.

N. C. Veterans Commission office is located on the second floor of the Hill - Parker Building, directly over Jabaley's Department Store, and next to the office of L. L. Mason, Attorney at Law, and will be glad to assist all veterans, their dependents and survivors.
