Full housepower — or adequate wiring — is definitely an asset in any home, old or new. With it, you'll find that your appliances work faster. You'll save steps. Long trailing electric cords—the kind that trip you up—disappear. And you'll get the full value of the electricity you buy because losses in circuit wiring are held to a minimum.

But, what is full housepower? It's enough wiring to permit electricity, the most flexible of servants, to serve you well. It's something that you have to figure out for yourself, starting with the ways that you now use electricity and adding to them the ways that you hope to use it in the future.

In your figuring, you'll allow for three kinds of branch circuits: general purpose, small appliances, and individual appliances.

The general purpose circuits serve lights all over the house and convenient outlets for your radio, vacuum cleaner, and other similar equipment. In general, you need one such circuit for each 500 square feet of floor area in your home.

The small appliance circuits supply electricity to the outlets in your kitchen, laundry, and dining area. As their name implies, they serve small appliances only.

Individual circuits serve such appliances as the range, dishwasher and garbage disposer, water heater, automatic washer, clothes drier, room air conditioner, food freezer, and other major appliances. Homes which had one such circuit a few years ago—usually for an electric range—now have a dozen or more of them.

Now add switch controls to "light your way" ahead wherever you're going in your home or on the grounds—and you've got full housepower.

All over the country new houses are going up. Homes are being remodeled and refurbished. One of these may be yours. Make sure it has full housepower. It will repay you in savings and satisfactions.

After you've counted up the number and types of circuits that you need, it's no trouble to figure the size of your service entrance. It will be large enough to furnish electricity to the circuits that you'll be using, plus at least two to grow on.

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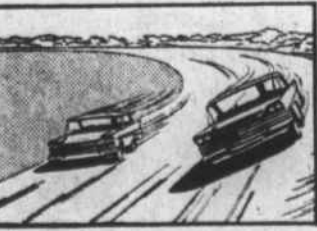
