A petition will soon be circulated by the Murphy Chamber of Commerce asking Road Supervisor McKee for a new road to Ducktown, connecting with the highway into Chattanooga.

For the first time in the history of this section, it is believed, the plan will have the united backing of Andrews, Bryson City, Sylva, Waynesville and even Asheville. It also is believed that the plan will find favor with Mr. McKee.

All roads—and a lot of mountain trails to boot—will lead to the Veterans CCC camp Saturday for the all day celebration of the camp's first birthday, and the seventh anniversary of the founding of the Civitan Conservation Corps. The camp, located across the Hiwassee River from Murphy, will hold "open house" beginning at 9 o'clock in the morning.

Contracts for painting and erecting the signs was let this week by the Chamber of Commerce and they will be in place before the tourist caravans begin to roll.

Mostly About You

If Western North Carolina wants to share in the unprecedented prosperity this country is experiencing, it must get more industry. Prosperity can only come to a region by three ways. It is best when they all happen together.

Tourists can bring in the money from all over the country and leave it in a region while vacationing; very healthy farming that employs a great deal of labor at high wages; and industry—these are the three "mosts" of prosperity.

As for tourism, few parts of our nation are more blessed than W. N. C. It has wonderful scenery and climate and is creating better tourist facilities and recreation all the time. As for farming, the same reason that makes our region so outstanding for tourism and vacationing, makes it less suitable for high income farming. As to industry, we have to overcome, through every possible effort, the old fashioned and completely wrong notion that the mountains don't lend themselves as suitably to industrial enterprises as flat land. Industry can certainly thrive in our region. The proof is in existing industries that offer a wonderful employment and usually excellent wages, to a large number of people. Some people think that the established industries don't like the idea of more industry coming to our region, but nothing could be further from the truth or from the facts. Industry usually thrives best when not completely alone, so here again is the proof in the eating of the pudding if you look at the mammoth corporations in New York or Detroit or Chicago or other industrial centers surrounded by hundreds upon hundreds of other industries.

Our manufacturers and our industries in the mountain region, without a lot of fanfare and drum beating, have done and are doing a great deal in their own way to help attract more industry here. It is not so much the point that they need it for their benefit, since they actually don't, but it is for them a question of civic pride and being a good citizen in wanting to do the most for the region where they thrive.

We can never hope to raise our level of prosperity by becoming a center of banking, financing, or commerce such as New York or San Francisco. Our natural location just doesn't lend itself for that. We cannot hope to become overnight a convention mecca such as New York, Chicago, St. Louis, or Miami. Only vast cities have the facilities to attract conventions. But we can, as a region together, certainly do an awful lot to attract more industry. We know that anything that is good for any part of our region is good for the whole region. And as a region we could also think to make W. N. C. "Convention Paradise U.S.A." We've got the climate, we've got the friendliest people in the world to make convention people feel at home and all of us together one day may each subscribe to a little bit of stock to build some of the most beautiful convention centers in the U.S. A convention center that has hotels and motels, shops, and all other facilities and who knows, one of these days on one of our wonderful summits there may be a summit meeting to bring humanity a lot closer to peace. I believe that our natural environment and wonderful help any group of people in finding better solutions when they meet.

Honesty begins at home in the 12th, and the people have a right to know that every advertisement and every column signed by me has been my idea, developed by me worked out by me and written by me.
