I have explained that the short-term Congressional race is not needed, since it will not give to our district any kind of representation. Therefore, please do not vote for me on June 25. If it was so urgent, and at that time it was, to fill the vacancy created after the death of David Hall, the special primary could well have been called for March (and without runoff), the special election could have been held in April. The short-term Congressman could have really worked a few months in Washington. I know the selfish reasons why this was not done. The political ring did not want it for they knew that Rollman would have been elected the Congressman, and work for all the people and would have told the members of the political machine where to get off.

Should you decide anyway to give me the majority on June 25 by writing my name on the ballot, as I hear many people plan to do, I will serve the 4 or 5 days that Congress is in session, but will not accept the \$11,000 pay that goes with it. No person is worth the pay of \$2,200 a day. Taxpayers cannot be treated as suckers forever.

If the government forces me to take the \$11,000 anyway, I will proportionately divide it amongst charitable organizations in all ten counties in our district. For your convenience, and at my own expense, I would open a Congressional office in the district. If trips have to be made to Washington on your behalf, I would make them at my own expense.

I will not cause you any expenses as Short-term Congressman.

One last explanation: I will not say between June 26 and November 8, "re-elect" Rollman, for that would be moral fraud.
