ASC News

1. Purpose—The main purpose of ASC price support programs may be outlined as activities designed (1) to maintain an adequate supply of food and fiber for all of our people and to promote trade and commerce with other nations, (2) to promote orderly marketing of our farm crops, especially at harvest time, and to place a floor under the price received for farm commodities by farmers.

2. The situation in North Carolina—Many thousands of dollars are lost in this state every year due to inadequacy of grain storage facilities. We are cautioning farmers in this county that this is the time of the year to make plans for adequate storage of their crops they plan to harvest this fall. The average annual value of grain crops grown in Cherokee County is approximately \$98,350. We believe that the 1959 crop would be average. What happens to this grain crop is of utmost concern to us. Our stewardship of this grain crop has been quite discouraging. The problem of price support program is not one of production, but rather one of making the best use of our crop production.

We are not primarily interested in increased production, but we are interested in the tremendous amount of money wasted each year for the lack of adequate storage. Interested to the extent that we believe that much of this waste can be salvaged and this money could be put in the pockets of Cherokee County farmers, at least a partial remedy may certainly be found in the better and more adequate storage and better care of the grain while storage.

3. Methods—Commercial storage is not available to farmers in Cherokee County and as a result of this farm storage is offered to farmers on the farm. It is necessary for the farmer to have his own storage bin and the C office has authority to offer loans to farmers to purchase this equipment as well as allow him a loan on the commodity stored. A farmer for a small fee of 1/2 cent per bushel in fact, may have his grain stored either on the farm or in a warehouse under purchase agreement and guarantee himself the loan rate when delivered for the account of CCC. This is the cheapest price insurance he can buy.

4. Administration—The rate set by the Secretary of Agriculture is dependent upon the supply and demand at the time and in compliance with price support laws. Congress. In the most cases the farmer gives a leeway in determining the high and low levels of price support rate. Most programs are administered under the supervision of the local county ASC Committee, which are in turn supervised and guided by the particular Commodity Division of the department. Loans are made directly from the local County ASC by means of Sight Drafts and Certificates of Interest. Farm-
