**Your Power Board Today**

When Thomas Edison invented the first practical incandescent lamp, there were only the open flame sources of light, the torch, the candle, the oil lamp, and gas mantle, with which to dispel darkness. Today, we take for granted the fluorescent incandescent, mercury, infrared and many other types of lighting. But, with all our familiarity with these various types of lighting, just how well is the desk lighted where your child will be doing his homework this school year? Do you have the proper lighting for him? Good lighting for comfortable seeing can surely make a bright student brighter, because it makes him work easier. The right desk lamp in the right place protects the eyes from the discomfort of glare and annoyance of contrasts and shadows. The right desk lamp for coping with homework may be either a table or wall model — or a pair of wall lamps, providing it has some way of reflecting the light. This means that the lamp should have a glass or plastic reflector bowl under the shade, a wide harp or a large indirect light bulb, or a plastic disc to shield the bare bulb glare. Such undershade devices produce a combination of

upward and downward diffused light that reduces the eye-irritating difference in brightness between the desk top and the rest of the room. The height of the lamp, too, is very important. A happy medium in height, in either table or wall lamps, is about 15 inches from top of desk to the bottom of the lamp shade. The bottom diameter of the shade also contributes to eye comfort and good seeing. Look for these minimum dimensions:  
Table lamp — bottom diameter of shade, 16 inches  
Single wall lamp — bottom diameter of shade, 13 inches  
Twin wall lamps, — bottom diameter of shade, 9 inches  
A light colored shade that is slightly translucent or opaque, lessens the contrast with light colored walls; if walls are dark, you may mount a larger tack board in light color on the wall facing the desk. For an adequate amount of light, the following size bulbs are recommended:  
Wall or table lamp — Minimum of 150 watts.  
Pair wall lamps — Minimum of 100 watts.  
If you use twin wall lamps, mount them 30 inches apart, measuring from the center of each shade. To get the full benefit of the light from a well-chosen lamp, you'll place it on the side of the desk, opposite the writing hand — on the left of the desk for a right-handed person, on the right side of the desk for a left-handed person.  
If your child's desk is highly polished, a light-colored desk blotter will make his seeing more comfortable. It will eliminate reflections and minimize contrast between the darkness of the desk top and the whiteness of book pages and writing paper.
