8) What will we do to fight communism, and where do we stand on world affairs, from Adak to Zanzibar?

9) What about inflation? Do we have some ideas to check its rise? What will we do about automation in regards to putting people out of work and what about the importance of sub-standard and cheap merchandise from other countries?

These are just a few of the things the people are going to want to ask us, Mr. Taylor. We should be available to answer them.

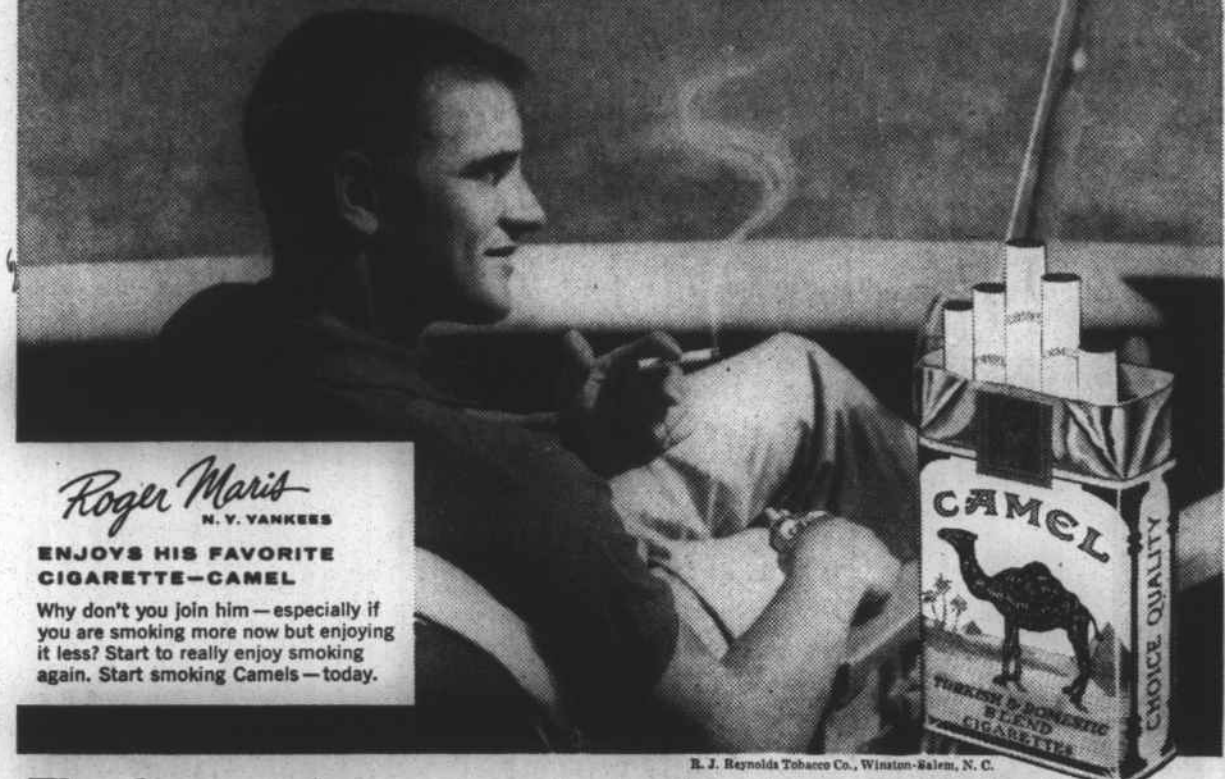

..... if you have worked 5 years out of the last 10 before you became disabled
..... and you have a severe disability which prevents any work

THE AMOUNT WORK REQUIRED FOR RETIREMENT AND SURVIVOR BENEFITS IS REDUCED

..... most people can become insured more quickly
..... some older people who did not work enough under the old law may become eligible

BEGINNING IN 1961 MOST BENEFICIARIES WHO WORK WILL HAVE LESS BENEFITS WITHHELD

..... the \$1200 yearly limitation is unchanged
..... but the method of determining how many yearly checks you are entitled to has been liberalized

OTHER IMPORTANT CHANGES

..... Benefits are increased for some children;
..... Parents who work for sons or daughters are covered beginning in 1961, EXCEPT for work around the house.

MORE CHANGES

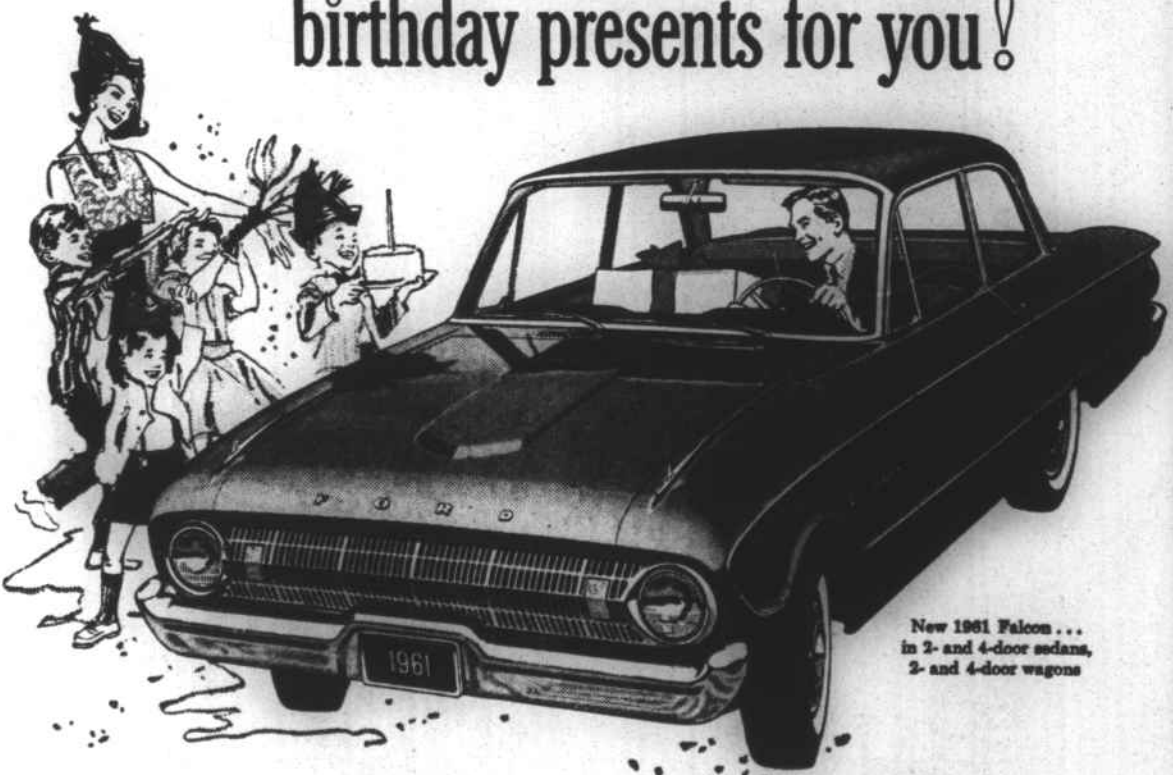
