Fifield has done an excal-lent job in telling Countees Potolska's story of the spirit world. Questions concerning mental telepathy and extra-

sensory perception may plague the reader long after he lays this book aside.

Countess Potolsks, fortune teller at a Mexican fiesta, is a refugee from the Third Reich and the holocaust of Warsaw. She now supports Reich and the helocaust of Warsaw, She now supports herself by clairvoyance among the American tourists and the natives of Mexico.

After Guido, the paidassistant, obtains necessary information about her clients, the Countess cleverly fakes her predictions of the future, Many of these turn out to be alarm-

these turn out to be alarm ingly accurate.
The reader is kept in such suspended belief in spiritualism that he, too, acknowledges the stature of Counters Patol-

ska as an all-knowing, all-As the Countess tries to

explain this phenomenon to herself, she loses her directon in the dark perimeters of the subconscious. She becomes a tragic figure seek-ing the meaning of life and her strange fascination for a man thirty years younger than she, After realizing a fault she has could cause un-bearable consequences, Coun-tess Potolska makes her de-

Is the mind really limited Is the mind really limited by time and memory? When and where does the mind cease to become conscious of reality and begin to drift into the spirit worls? Fifield's plot holds, indirectly and unstated, that the human mind can and does triumph occasionally in its struggle toward under-standing and realizing its potentialities. Do you agree?
