**BOOK REVIEW "The Sign Of Taurus"**

Fifield has done an excellent job in telling Countess Potolska's story of the spirit world. Questions concerning mental telepathy and extra-sensory perception may plague the reader long after he lays this book aside.

Countess Potolska, fortune teller at a Mexican fiesta, is a refugee from the Third Reich and the holocaust of Warsaw. She now supports herself by clairvoyance among the American tourists and the natives of Mexico.

After Guido, the paid assistant, obtains necessary information about her clients, the Countess cleverly fakes her predictions of the future. Many of these turn out to be alarmingly accurate.

The reader is kept in such suspended belief in spiritualism that he, too, acknowledges the stature of Countess Potolska as an all-knowing, all-seeing prophetess.

As the Countess tries to explain this phenomenon to herself, she loses her direction in the dark perimeters of the subconscious. She becomes a tragic figure seeking the meaning of life and her strange fascination for a man thirty years younger than she. After realizing a fault she has could cause unbearable consequences, Countess Potolska makes her decision.

Is the mind really limited by time and memory? When and where does the mind cease to become conscious of reality and begin to drift into the spirit world? Fifield's plot holds, indirectly and unstated, that the human mind can and does triumph occasionally in its struggle toward understanding and realizing its potentialities.
