Antlerless Deer Hunts Scheduled
Hunts for antlerless deer are scheduled for the following wildlife management areas:
December 12-13, starting at 12:00 noon and 10:00 a.m. respectively on Fires Creek, Standing Indian, Harmon Den and Rich Laurel areas. December 12-13, starting at 2:00 p.m. and 12:00 respectively on Uwharrie and Pisgah areas. December 12, starting at 2:00 p.m. on Mt. Mitchell, Daniel Boone and Sandhills wildlife management areas. On the Uwharrie and Sandhills areas hunters will be allowed to take deer of either sex, the other hunts will be for antlerless deer only. A second day of either sex hunting originally scheduled for the Sandhills area has been cancelled.

44 Cases of Polio Reported in State
A total of forty-five cases of paralytic poliomyelitis have been reported thus far in 1960. Twenty-three out of the forty-four cases were of persons who had received no doses of Salk Vaccine. Twelve more had received less than three.

Over 61 per cent of the cases were in the birth to four age group with over 77 per cent occurring in children under ten. More boys than girls were reported as having polio.

The State Board of Health is now recommending four doses of Salk vaccine.

ASC News

The 1961 Agricultural Conservation Program has been developed and is to be carried out on the basis of the following general principals.
1. The National program contains broad authorities to help meet the varied soil and water conservation problems of the nation, State and county committees and the participating agencies design a program for each state and county. Such programs include limitations and restrictions, necessary for the maximum in conservation accomplishments in the area. The programs are confined to the soil and water conservation practices on which Federal cost-sharing is most needed in order to achieve the maximum conservation benefits in the state and county.
2. The state and county programs are designed to encourage these soil and water conservation practices which provide the most enduring conservation benefits practically attainable in 1961 on the land which they are to be applied.
3. Cost will be shared with the farmer only on satisfactorily performed soil and water conservation practices for which Federal cost-sharing is requested by the farmer before the conservation is begun.
4. Cost is shared only on soil and water conservation practices which it is believed farmers would not carry out to the needed extent without program assistance.
5. The rates of cost-sharing for the county are the minimum required to result in substantially increased performance of needed soil and water conservation practices within the limits prescribed within the national program.
6. The purpose of the program is to help achieve additional conservation on land now in agricultural production rather than to bring more land into agricultural production. The program is not applicable to the development of new or additional farmland by measures such as drainage or land clearing.
7. When the Federal government shares the cost of the initial application of soil and water conservation practices which farmers would not perform but which are essential to sound soil and water conservation the farmer should assume responsibility for the upkeep and maintenance of these practices through the life span, unless the practice failed during its life span due to conditions beyond the control of the farmer.
