Words Of Life

We are now entering into the fourth week of the Advent, which will bring us into the events of the birth of the promised "Christ," translated "The Anointed One". We have seen in the last weeks discussion that he was to be the Lion of the Tribe of Judah.

Events of the last thousand years before Christ began shaping themselves to the effect that the reality of a Monarchy of a Jewish Kingdom became more and more dim. The glory of such a kingdom began to crumble when Salomon's Realm was divided into two weak states, namely the kingdom of Israel and the kingdom of Judah. They were further decimated by their captivity in the next five hundred years, climaxed with the sacking of Jerusalem and the destruction of the Temple.

During the period from David to the end of direct prophecies in Malachi were inspired prophets who gave in detail the personal descriptions of the Messiah. The birth place was pointed out as Bethlehem in Judea by Micah 5:2, indicating that the direct descendants of David were to have the homestead until the birth of the Messiah. He was to be the Prince of the House of David.

Since much of the character of a person is often revealed by the title of a person, his names are given in full by the major prophet Isaiah in chapter 9:6. They were to be: "Wonderful, Coun-cillor, the Mighty God, the Everlasting Father, the Prince of Peace." All of these names have been applied exclusively to Jesus Christ in his subsequent history, though the last one given is by far the most outstanding. His first name "Jesus" was finally told to Joseph in the dream, which convinced this stepfather of the Messiah of the purity of the mother of Christ. This significant name means "Savior", and the reason for this is also given in Mathew 1:21.

The spiritual conception of Mary stands or falls the Salvation of mankind.

Isaiah also gives a complete description of the life history of the Christ. In Isaiah 53 we are told that he was to be of average stature. He was neither outstanding in beauty nor in physical strength. Universal popularity and admiration was not to be his fame. Indeed he was to be chastised by whipping, and finally slaughtered like a lamb, and through all this he would neither complain nor defend himself. These and other prophecies came true in photographic clearness during his final period of passion.

The last identifying detail was given in the last words of the Old Testament. It concerned the royal forerunner or Herald of the Prince of Peace. Preceded by only three months this Herald foretold in detail in Malachi 4:5-6. Even the fullness of time was indicated by inference by the prophetic silence of 420 years, between the Old Testament and the New Testament, equal to the time of sojourn of Israel in the land of Egypt.

This brings us to the very door steps of the Advent of the Savior in the stable of Bethlehem in Judea.

Peter J. Hanlon Named NC National Forest Supervisor

Atlanta, Ga. - Peter J. Hanlon will be the New Forest Supervisor of the North Carolina National Forests, according to an announcement here by J. K. Vessey, Southern Regional Forester for the U. S. Forest Service.

Hanlon succeeds Hugh Redding, who is retiring after 38 years of Federal service. Hanlon, who has 26 years with the U. S. Forest Service, will transfer to Asheville, N. C., from the Eastern Regional Office of the Forest Service in Upper Darby, Pa., about the first of the year. A native of Syracuse, N. Y., Hanlon has had wide experience in forestry since graduating from New York State College of Forestry in 1929.

National Forest Pay \$19,100 To Cherokee County

Neighbors are usually considered to be those people who live near us. They are those people who are citizens or residents of the same community. They are those people who live along the same road or along the same creek, or in the same small village or town. A neighbor is someone who makes up part of our daily life, someone we see often, someone we can call on for help. A neighbor in turn is one who depends on us in his daily life.

As neighbors, we not only depend on one another, but collectively we make up a part of a larger neighborhood. Members of small communities join with the members of other communities and towns to make up a larger neighborhood -- the county in which we live.

Being citizens of a county, we depend on the county for many things in our daily life. We depend on the county for protection, for medical help, for roads and schools. All this we have a right to expect as citizens of a county. But we have a right to expect these benefits only if we and our neighbors do our share in contributing to the cause that makes these benefits possible. Since all of us cannot actually build the roads or teach our school children, we do our part by contributing to the cost of these benefits in the form of taxes. Through the combined contribution of all our neighbors, these benefits are possible. The National Forest, as your neighbor, makes its contribution also. Your National Forest contributes its share by paying to the State 25% of its receipts. This money is made available to the counties in which the National Forest is located on a per acre basis to be used for county roads and schools.

Final figures for these 25% fund payments have just been released. The amount to be paid to the State of North Carolina from FY 1960 receipts based on acreage as of 6/30/59 totals \$227,574.84. The amounts allocated to the Tusquitee Ranger District are as follows:

Cherokees Bring Problems To Taylor's Secretary

Tom L. Mallonee, district secretary to 12th District Congressman Roy A. Taylor, talked in Murphy last week with a number of Cherokee County residents with problems needing congressional attention.

Veterans' problems, postmaster's problems, and military academies topped the list of areas about which Cherokee citizens had questions.

The district secretary, a former veterans' service official, offered assistance to a Murphy woman who had experienced difficulty in completing a complicated VA form.

He also talked to several persons with inquiries about applicants to fill jobs now held by temporary postmasters at Marble and Andrews.

Present acting postmasters at the two places, neither of whom has been confirmed by the U. S. Senate, are Carlyle P. Matherson at Andrews and Wayne J. Edwards at Marble.

The new Postmaster General, when he assumes office about Feb. 20, must determine whether vacancies will be filled by promotion of a presently-qualified employee or employment of a new applicant who has passed the examination.

The district secretary, who was in Hayesville the day before coming here, also talked about appointments to military academies. The congressional office is able to make a limited number of these appointments. Applicants must pass a rigid test administered by the service in which they are interested. At present the office has three times more applications than allotted appointments.

Presbyterians Plan Candlelight Service For Christmas Eve

Advent and Christmas services at Murphy Presbyterian Church reach a climax with the annual candlelight Christmas Eve Communion service, at 8 o'clock Saturday night, December 24. That worship is also for Baptism of adults and infants, and the public reception of members.

Other gatherings of Advent and Christmas time will include the youth program at 7:30 Sunday evening December 18; and the Christmas treat and party at the Education-Fellowship Building, Wednesday night December 21, with John A. Thompson, Church School Superintendent, in charge.

At morning worship next Sunday, December 11, Rev. Robert A. Potter, is to preach upon the theme "When the Child Arrives," and the choir is to sing, "What Child is This?" At evening worship a film-strip concerning the care of aged ministers and their families -- it is for this cause that Presbyterians bring their joy gift at Christmas -- will be shown.

The sermon theme for Sunday morning, December 18, is "We Do Have Good News," and for Christmas Day morning worship, "Do We Make Room For Jesus Christ?" Special music by the choir and appropriate hymns for the congregation will mark these services.

Women of the Church have their annual combined circle Christmas gathering at the Fellowship Hall Monday evening December 12, with Mrs. Franklin Smith in charge of Program.
