Soil Conservation News

By John Smith The Cherokee County Soll Conservation District has just completed its seventh year of operation, the most successful so far. During 1960 more than two hundred farmers were assisted in establishing one or more soil and water conservation practices on their farms.

Complete Soil & Water Conservation Plans were developed by fifty five farmers with ssistance of technicians of the Soil Conservation Service. cooperating with the District. These plans include two aerial photographs of the individual farm, one of which shows the types and classes of soils contained within the farm bound aires, and the second shows the phusical features such as roads, buildings, field divisions, streams, woodland, and so forth. The plans also in -clude general information and instructions for carrying out the needed conservation measures. farmers signed Sixty cooperative agreements with District, the preliminary step in the process leading to a complete soil and water con servation plan. At the end of 1960, four hundred thirty farmers in Cherokee County signed cooperative agreements with the District, and two hundred nine-ty six of these had received complete soil and water conservation plans covering their farms. One of the most common practices for which farmers request assistance is the es-tablishment of tile drainag. During 1960, approximately Twenty five farmers asked for assistance in laying off and establishing tile ditches. About twenty of these farmers completed the ditches, resulting in the use of eight thousand one hundred fifty feet of 4 inch and 6 inch drain tile. In addition to the tile drain age, more than two thousand five hundred feet of open ditch-es were surveyed and constructed. These two types of drainage resulted in better and more economical farming one about one hundred acres of for-merly wet land, which now can meriy wet and, which how can produce good crops or pasture. Another important conser-vation practice carried out by a large no. of farmers is tree planting. Conservation farm-ers re-established about two hundred twenty acres of woodland. Part of this was by tree planting and by allowing natural seeding to do the job.





HOW MUCH ELECTRIC BILL Here's how to figure your cost: Residential Rates

To figure the monthly cost of using any electric appliance you must know three things: 14

Water Pump

1. The number of kilowatt-hours that the appliance will use.

2. How much electricity costs.

3. The number of kilowatt-hours that you now use in one month.

From the table above, you found the number of kilowatthours that an appliance will use in one month. The chart on the right shows how much you pay for electricity.

You can get the number of kilowatt-hours that you now use from an old bill. (This can also be estimated from the chart on the right.)

How to use this information ...

Let's say you now use around 150 kwh a month. Your bill runs around \$3.00 a month. And you'd like to know how much it will cost to operate an electric range.

From the figures at the top of the page, you see that an electric range uses about 150 kwh a month. Add this to the number of kwh you now use. The new total is 300 kwh. From the chart on the right, you find that you'd pay \$4.63 for 300 kwh. That means your bill would

go up \$1.63 a month - less than 64 a day - when you add an electric range. (If you now use more than 150 kwh a month, it would be even

less!) Notice that although the amount of

electricity used exactly doubled, the size of the bill went up only \$1.63. - from \$3.00 to \$4.63.

That's the nice thing about our "stair-step" rates . . . as your use goes up . . . your average cost goes down!
