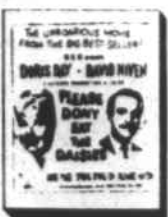

ASC NEWS 1961 Burley Tobacco Allotment For Cherokee County Up 6%

Cherokee County farmers will have 6 percent more acres on which they may plant burley tobacco in 1961. Official notice was received of this in the county office Feb. 5. This increase was made possible by an improved supply and demand situation as far as burley tobacco is concerned.

The 6 percent will be factored and added to each burley allotment on all allotments of 0.09 acres or more.

Burley allotments will be prepared showing the increase and mailed to burley growers on February 20, 1961.

The ASC office will accept requests for premeasurement of 1961 burley tobacco acreage; the final date for requesting this service is March 15. The farmer will be required to deposit \$8.00 minimum to cover the cost of premeasurement. A 11 premeasured acreage will be accepted as the official measured acreage for all ASC purposes provided the farmer plants the entire premeasured area and no more, and provided there was no obvious error made in the premeasurement.

Approvals and purchase orders were mailed to farmers requesting ACP assistance during the initial sign up period.

The list of eligible vendors is furnished with purchase order. The farmer selects the vendor to fill his purchase order from among the list of eligible vendors and make

the necessary arrangements with the vendor to furnish the authorized materials.

If the purchase order is lost, stolen or destroyed, the farmer should advise the county ASC office immediately.

The county ASC Committee approved approximately \$20,000 to farmers that made requests during the initial sign up period. The county office will continue to take requests and issue approvals on the first come first serve basis, will be served so long as funds are available.

This is the ideal time to get necessary arrangements made for spring practices.

Taylor Gives Area Redevelopment BIM Careful Study

Congressman Roy A. Taylor Monday, February 6, was reelected for a two-year term as a member of the important House Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs.

By his reelection, the 12th Congressional District representative was elevated in seniority to the 12th position among 18 Democrats serving on the 32-member Interior body.

Taylor's gain in seniority was a direct result of his election last summer to complete the unexpired term of the late Rep. David M. Hall of Sylva and his subsequent appointment to the committee.

Since then, Taylor said, a number of Congressmen have left the committee to accept cabinet and other posts, other committees, or because they were not reelected last November.

"These vacancies have enabled me to move up six places in seniority," Taylor said.

He counted this as particularly significant because the Interior and Insular Affairs Committee supervises operation of the Great Smoky Mountains National Park, Blue Ridge Parkway, Cherokee Indian Reservation, and also handles appropriations for and a portion of the administrative control of National Forests.

"I am delighted to continue on this important committee, because of the excellent position it places me in to serve Western North Carolina," Taylor said.

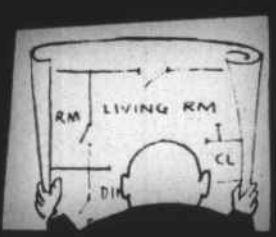
