Jerry Hice, Beulah Shope Receive Player Awards, Coach Walsh Honored

Robbinsville - The Robbinsville High School Blue Devils brought its basketball season to a close last Tuesday night, February 21, when the Robbinsville boys were eliminated by the Murphy Bulldogs and Robbinsville girls were eliminated by Hayesville. With the end of these two games, a young lady and young man, long to be remembered by sports fans of Robbinsville, brought their basketball careers to end with a glorious finish.

Miss Beulah M. Shope, 18, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Blaine Shope of Robbinsville. When fans forget Beu-

lah's name, they will still recall Number 44 who mastered the intricate techniques which make a star, and her impassable ability.

Beulah played with the Robbinsville High School varsity squad the four years she was in high school, making first team her sophomore, junior, and senior years.

During her junior year, Beulah was named to the All-Conference team of the Western Division of the Smoky Mountain Conference. She also received the honor of being named the Most Outstanding

Player of the Western Division.

This her senior year, she was again named to the All-Conference Team of the Western Division. She was also chosen this year for the North Carolina All-Star Team to meet in Raleigh in April.

In her sophomore year, Beulah averaged 30 points a game; her junior year, 33 points a game; and her senior year, 31 points a game.

Beulah was the first girl to score 50 points in one game in regular play in the Smoky Mountain Conference, including

Jerry Hice, 18, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Pearl Hice of Robbinsville. No one realized when this sandy-haired boy walked out on the court his sophomore year, that he was a future Most Outstanding Player of the Smoky Mountain Conference. Yet, during his three years as first team varsity player, Jerry has proven his outstanding ability on the basketball court.

He averaged scoring 23 points per game during his senior year. A number appropriate in itself, Jerry Hice, number 23, will be remembered long after he has graduated.

Saturday night, February 25, Jerry culminated his career by being named to the All-Conference team of the Smoky Mountain Conference; and, most important, he was presented with a trophy after being named the Most Outstanding Player of the Western Division.

Each year, fans have viewed the awarding of these trophies to the Robbinsville players with much pride. This year, still another honor was bestowed upon the Robbinsville Athletic team.

Coach Modeal Walsh was named the Most Outstanding Coach in the Western Division of the Smoky Mountain Conference and was presented with a trophy Saturday night, February 25, in Franklin at the scene of the playoffs between the eastern division and western division.

In 1957, Coach Walsh was the assistant football coach at Robbinsville and the head basketball coach. From 1958 until the present, he has been head football and basketball coach at Robbinsville.

As the Robbinsville teams were presented with the Sportsmanship trophy last year, the girls team was presented with the trophy for the conference championship during regular season with a 11-1 record; Miss Kaye Stone and Miss Beulah Shope were named to the girls' All-Conference team; and Mr. Dee McMonigle was named to the boys' All-Conference team, everyone realized that Coach Walsh was a champion builder.

Once again the fans of Robbinsville express their admiration to Coach Walsh as he has produced an outstanding football team and two outstanding basketball teams.

Wild Auto Chase Ends In Damage To 2 Cars, Truck

Robbinsville - A wild but brief chase ended abruptly Sunday evening when the driver of one of the vehicles hit a parked car and truck, damaging all three vehicles. The driver and two passengers were arrested.

Patrolman W. R. Boyles gave this account of the chase: Boyles saw someone driving a 1959 Ford recklessly through town, and he turned his patrol car to give chase.

The other car sped down the highway for a distance amounting to some five city blocks. The driver apparently lost control of the car, which struck a parked pickup truck and sedan on the left side of the road. The car and truck, owned by James Robert Tippett, were parked in front of the Tippett home. The truck was a total loss, Boyles said.

Boyles reported that he arrested the driver of the offending car, Jerry Howard Nelms, 21, of Route 1, Robbinsville, and charged him with driving while intoxicated and reckless driving.

Boyles also arrested two passengers in the car, whom he identified as Ray Moody, 32, of Robbinsville, and Edwin Holder 20, also of Robbinsville. They were charged with public drunkenness.

A hearing was set for Monday morning, February 27, before a justice of the peace in Robbinsville.
