Most importantly, amblyopia is a serious distoder. And it is widespread. A recent study revealed that of all men of military age handicapped by poor vision in one eye, 66 per cent had amblyopia.

Fortunately, though, optometric scientists have deweloped techniques now of correcting amblyopia quite successfully. However, it must be detected at an early age and before it has had the chance to progress.

an examination not later the the age of four. Those with obvious eyesight handicaps should be taken to the family vision specialist much sooner

To the despair of many parents who postpone proper care of their child's vision, they find the delay has bee costly in the development of his most precious possession, vision, at one of the most vital stages of his life. THE READERS CORNER

Q: How widespread are visual disorders among the schoolage children?

A: The most reliable estimates place the percentage of children at one-third of the total school enrollment, This means that about 7,000,000 children nationwide have vision problems.
The Southern Council of Op-

tometrists reports that of every 1,000 children now in the fifth grade, only 533 will grad-uate from high school. The council points out that neg-lected vision problems are responsible for many of these failures.




