North Carolina Legislative Bulletin

(Editors Note: Included in this Bulletin is a digest of all local legislation introduced or acted upon by the General Assembly during the week ending March 24, 1961 affecting your county or any municipality therein.)

CHEROKEE COUNTY
HB 265 - Introduced by West, Mar. 21

"Relating to the compensation of certain officials, jurors, and \$3 to witnesses, for each day of required attendance in superior court. Provides for following annual salaries for county officials, effective April 1, 1961: clerk of superior court, \$5,000; deputy CSC, \$2,400; register of deeds, \$4,000; clerk in register's office, \$2,400."

CHEROKEE COUNTY
HB 265 - Introduced by West, Mar. 21

"Relating to the compensation of certain officials, jurors and witnesses in Cherokee County." (Provides for \$7 daily pay to jurors, and \$3 to witnesses, for each day of required attendance in superior court. Provides for following annual salaries for county officials, effective April 1, 1961: clerk of superior court, \$5,000; deputy CSC, \$2,400; register of deeds, \$4,000; Clerk in register's office, \$2,400.)
March 24, passed House.

CLAY COUNTY
HB 248 - Introduced by West, Mar. 20

"To provide for the election of the Board of Education of Clay County." (Provides for 3-member county board of education to be elected for 2-year terms at general county election in 1964 and biennially thereafter. Vacancies to be filled for unexpired term by remaining board members. Nomination and election to be held at same time and in same manner as for other county officers. Persons elected take office last Monday in April following year of election. Those elected in 1964 take office last Monday in April, 1965, following expiration of terms of persons named in annexed act of 1957, 1959, and 1961, said appointments to expire on said last Monday. On expiration of term of R. L. Long, Frank Bristol appointed to serve until April 1, 1965.)

Bible Questions And Answers

Q. How do we know that Holy Ghost baptism doesn't happen today?
A. Because the Bible shows us that it ceased before the New Testament was completed.

There are two examples of Holy Ghost baptism happening in the Bible. They are found in Acts 2 and Acts 10. In Acts 2 verses 1-6 we read of Holy Ghost baptism coming upon the Apostles of Christ. This was the beginning of the church or kingdom upon earth - Mk. 9:1; Lk. 24:46-49; Acts 1:1-9. The second case is found in Acts 10 where it came upon Cornelius and his household (the first Gentiles to enter the church or kingdom). From Acts 2 through Acts 9 we read of only Jews becoming Christians.

Now in Acts 2:8; 9 & 10 we read also of water baptism. Later on though when Paul wrote to the church in Ephesus he said, "There is one baptism." Ep. 4:4. The baptism that had ceased was Holy Ghost baptism for in First Peter 3:20-21 we read, "...in the days of Noah ... eight souls were saved by water. The like Figure whereunto even baptism doth also now save us (not the putting away of the filth of the flesh, but the answer of a good conscience toward God...), by the resurrection of Jesus Christ.)"

To teach that Holy Ghost Baptism is still in force is to disbelieve and deny the teaching of God, Christ and the Holy Ghost - The Bible. The only baptism in force today is water baptism and it in one of the things necessary to obey to be saved. Matt. 28: 18-20; Mk. 16:15-16; Acts 2:38; Acts 22:16.
