

### THIS WEEK IN THE LEGISLATURE

Activity in the form of the introduction of numerous local bills, aside from the work of the various committees in conducting hearings and preparing legislation to be presented, marked the order of proceedings this week in the legislature. Measures dealing with revocation of driver's licenses under the point system, compulsory school attendance, study commission proposals and machinery to keep government going in case of atomic attack were, among others, presented also.

The House passed and sent to the Senate a bill requested by Governor Sanford to increase the size of the State Board of Conservation and Development from 18 to 28 members.

A new tax proposal was introduced this week by Representative Hines of Guilford. This bill provides by taxation of tobacco products, soft drinks, sales of jewelry, luggage, etc. (luxury tax), gross receipts of power companies, realty transfers and costs assessed in criminal cases, for the raising of approximately \$90 million in new revenue without taxing food and drugs. This is only one of many tax measures offered.

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### From The Desk Of State Senator

Beginning the 56th Legislative day of the present session of the General Assembly your Senator continues to be apprehensive about several vital issues confronting this session.

Important bills dealing with redistricting of the congressional districts and reapportionment of the Senate continue to be held up in committees without the full body being able to vote and to deal with these matters with dispatch.

Full scale hearings will begin in Finance this week with several weeks of these hearings already being scheduled before these important money bills will be sent to the sub-committees for further study. The wheels of government grind slowly; and this is good for this two-body government in North Carolina, the Senate and the House each having to concur with the other before any legislation is passed -- local or otherwise. This makes for every bill a fair study before it is enacted into law.

Your Senator introduced a bill last week dealing with the eligibility of small communities to be qualified for housing projects under the Federal Housing Act. I introduced such a bill from a standpoint of local interest, making it apply to the 33rd district. Some 29 counties joined with me in that endeavor. The question that this must be of state-wide nature to be constitutional was raised by the Federal Housing Administration and was carried up to the Supreme Court. The Supreme Court held that in their opinion it was not constitutional -- hence the reason for a new state-wide bill to correct this situation.

Visitors in Raleigh last week were E. J. Whitmore of Franklin, Beekman Huger and George Stephens of Asheville, and H. A. Mattox of Murphy. H. A. was attending the State School Board meeting in the interest of better schools in North Carolina. His work in this is outstanding.

IN THE STATE Bill Sharpe, former publisher of the Twin City tabloid, "Thursday", is coming out with another edition on columns of this State. This time he is writing on Raleigh writers -- the syndicated variety -- in the State Magazine which he publishes.
