Small Watershed Project Needed on Valley River, Says Agent

A law passed by the Congress in 1954, officially known as Public Law Sóó, but popularly known as the Small Watersheds Act, makes it possible for the residents of a particular watershed to seek assistance for construction. By John Smith

A group of about thirty far-mers from the Peachtree and Slow Creek sections met at Peachtree School late in March for the purpose of dis-cussing the formation of a Watershed Association in that area. 
