The authority is the Bible the Words of Christ - Jn. 12:48 "He that rejecteth me, and receiveth not my words, hath one that judgeth him: the word that I have spoken the same shall judge him in the last day."
For instance some people felt it was right to try to worship by washing their hands as a religious ceremony. Jesus said to them, "Howbeit in vain do they worship me, teaching for doctrines the commandments of men." Mark 7:7
