From The Desk Of STATE SENATOR W. FRANK FORSYTH 33RD DISTRICT

Your Senator, along with twelve other folks from the House and Senate, went to breakfast at the Governor's Mansion last Thursday. The purpose of the meeting was to study ways of speeding up the legislature for an early adjournment.

The Governor discussed his tax program and felt that the subcommittee should make its recommendations to the full finance committee as quickly as possible. Following his suggestions, the Senate subcommittee reported to the full committee on Thursday afternoon. The appropriations committee spendings on paper are ahead of new revenue. Although nothing has been voted on yet by a full legislature, the appropriations subcommittee is recommending spending money faster than the finance subcommittee's recommendations for raising it.

The appropriations group tentatively approved general fund spending for the next biennium \$75,772,829 over the recommended budget and has, also, recommended capital improvement spending an estimated eight million dollars above the \$7 million dollars recommended by the advisory budget commission. Most of the capital improvements will be financed by bond issues which must be voted on by the people. For each million dollars in bonds, about one hundred thousand dollars must be set aside in the biennium to pay off the debt.

Thus the net effect of the appropriations subcommittee's tentative action would add some 76 million dollars to the recommended general fund budget. The tax package agreed upon last week in the joint finance subcommittee would bring in only 73 million dollars.

Governor Sanford has recommended using an estimated 19 million dollars of accumulated surplus to finance secondary roads. This surely would be a windfall for the smaller rural counties for they would receive most of this money for their badly needed secondary roads. Your Senator, along with others, has

Raleigh, N.C. -- Governor Terry Sanford has announced the appointment of Edwin R. Lidseen of Hayesville to head the drive in Clay County to save the Battleship North Carolina. Lidseen, who has been named along with 99 other county drive chairmen as an "Admiral of the Fleet" in the North Carolina Navy, will direct the Clay County effort to provide its share of the \$250,000 needed from public subscription to tow the giant ship from Bayonne, New Jersey, to Wilmington, N.C., and establish it as a permanent educational exhibit and memorial to men and women of all the U. S. Military services in World War II.

Former Graham Resident Gets Hospital Post

Durham, N. C. -- Mrs. Jessie Lee Wilkins, staff pharmacist at the Duke University Medical Center since 1943, has been named assistant chief pharmacist for the new Wake County Hospital in Raleigh. She will assume this post around July 1.

Born in Judson and reared in Robbinsville; Mrs. Wilkins holds the B.S. degree from the University of North Carolina School of Pharmacy.

She was nominated two years ago for the title of "Outstanding Handicapped North Carolinian of 1959," and in 1958 was named Handicapped Employee of the Year by the Durham lodge of B'nai B'rith. These honors were based on her rehabilitation and accomplishments through the years following a childhood polio attack.

Mrs. Wilkins' professional affiliations include the American Pharmaceutical Association, American Society of Hospital Pharmacists. She is a member of the Pilot Club, one of Durham's oldest civic organizations for professional women.
