### Legal Notice - Clay County, N. C.

ORDER AUTHORIZING \$33,446.69 BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF CLAY TO FUND AND REFUND INDEBTEDNESS PAYABLE TO THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF NORTH CAROLINA.

BE IT ORDERED by the Board of Commissioners of the County of Clay:

Section 1. That bonds of the County of Clay of the maximum aggregate principal amount of \$33,446.69 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the County Finance Act, as amended, for the purpose of funding and refunding valid existing debt of said County incurred by said County as an administrative agency of the State of North Carolina for the necessary expenses of providing the six-month school term as a part of the uniform State system of public schools as required by the Constitution of North Carolina and evidenced by the following notes, and unpaid and accrued interest thereon, held by and payable to the State Board of Education of North Carolina:

I. \$3,150 balance of an issue of notes evidencing a loan of the 1961 Special Building Fund, dated April 27, 1922, and consisting of seven notes of \$450 each numbered 14 to 20 inclusive, maturing annually on December 15, in numerical order, one note in each of the years 1935 to 1941, inclusive, and bearing interest at the rate of 4-1/2% per annum.

II. \$3,600 balance of an issue of notes evidencing a loan of the 1921 Special Building Fund, dated March 1, 1923, and consisting of eight notes of \$450 each numbered 13 to 20, inclusive, maturing annually on December 15, in numerical order, one note in each of the years 1935 to 1942, inclusive, and bearing interest at the rate of 4-1/2% per annum.

III. \$8,100 balance of an issue of notes evidencing a loan of the 1923 Special Building Fund, dated March 10, 1924, and consisting of nine notes of \$900 each numbered 12 to 20, inclusive, maturing annually on December 15, in numerical order, one note in each of the years 1935 to 1943, inclusive, and bearing interest at the rate of 4-1/2% per annum.

IV. \$16,250 balance of an issue of notes evidencing a loan of the 1927 Special Building Fund, dated March 30, 1928, and consisting of thirteen notes of \$1,250 each numbered 8 to 20, inclusive, maturing annually on December 15, in numerical order, one note in each of the years 1935 to 1947, inclusive, and bearing interest at the rate of 4-1/2% per annum.

V. \$1,050 balance of an issue of notes evidencing a loan of the State Literary Fund, dated February 10, 1931, and consisting of seven notes of \$150 each numbered 4 to 10, inclusive, maturing annually on February 10, in numerical order, one note in each of the years 1935 to 1941, inclusive and bearing interest at the rate of 4% per annum.

VI. \$1,296.69 of unpaid interest matured before and accrued to January 1, 1940, being fifty per centum (50%) of such interest on (a) notes of the issues described in I, II, and III above amounting to \$1,054.58, (b) notes of the issue described in IV above and amounting to \$1,291.47 and (c) notes of the issue described in V above and amounting to \$247.34.

Sec. 2. That a tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of the bonds here in authorized when due shall be annually levied and collected.

Sec. 3. That a sworn statement of the debt of the County for school purposes has been filed with the Clerk and is open to public inspection.

Sec. 4. That this order shall take effect upon its passage and shall not be submitted to the voters.

The foregoing order has been introduced and a sworn statement has been filed under the County Finance Act showing the assessed valuation of the county to be \$4,040,557 and the net debt for school purposes including the proposed bonds, to be \$37,446.69. A tax will be levied for the payment of the proposed bonds and interest, if the same shall be issued. Any citizen or taxpayer may protest against the issuance of such bonds at a meeting of the Board of County Commissioners to be held at 10:00 o'clock a.m., July 3, 1961 or an adjournment thereof.
