You and Your Insurance

Hyde Many thousands of motorists are saving money on their automobile insurance under "safe driver insurance plans" which capital stock insurance companies have already introduced in 34 states, according to the Insurance Information Institute, A Bill creating such a plan in now pending before the North Carolina General

Assembly. Generally speaking, these plans are based on a penalty point system. Points are charged for accidents in which the policy holder is atfault, for serious traffic vio-ons. If he accumulates lations. points, he pays higher premiums for his insurance. points, But if his record remains clear, he pays a lower premium than usual. Thus, the plans encourage safe driving. .

By placing a dollar value on careful driving, the plan pro-vides a motorist with a strong incentive to mind his highway manners and develop the defensive driving habits essential to the avoidance of accidents.

This is a reason why the safe driver plan has been endorsed enthusiastically by many motor vehicle administrators as a valuable ally of highway

safety. Good drivers have long protested against having to pay the same premium as those who cause accidents through their recklessness and disregard of the highway laws. The safe driver plan not only re-cognizes the merits of careful driving through a premium saving, but provides a fin-ancial inducement to the careless to be more alert in the future.

The reception of the safe driver plan by the public has demonstrated that the great majority of motorists favor insurance rating based upon the driving record of individ-uais, a method by which those with clear driving records during the experience period pay lower rates than accidentprone drivers -- those with a record of mishaps and serious motor vehicle traffic violations, the Institue stated.

Three of every four drivers qualify for the safe driver plan rate discount, national studies show.

Ouestions sometimes are raised as to whether drivers with records of convictions for serious traffic violations should be classed in the same category with drivers having accident records. A distinc-tion between the two groups would be meaningless. Official state studies have demonstrated that, as drivers accumulate a record of traffic violations, they also are likely to accumulate a record of accidents.

This was borne out, for example, by a study of some 95,000 drivers in California. Drivers in this study with no records of moving traftic violations had a much better accident record than did those dirvers who had been con-victed of traffic violations.

Over the three-year period on which the study was based, those who were free from moving traffic violations had a ratio of only nine accidents for every 100 drivers Drivers violations in their record had a ratio of 50 accidents for 100 drivers. A study in Texas showed a similar correlation between traffic violations and
