Swing me, Mommy, she says. Swing me high! All the way up to the clouds, if you can!

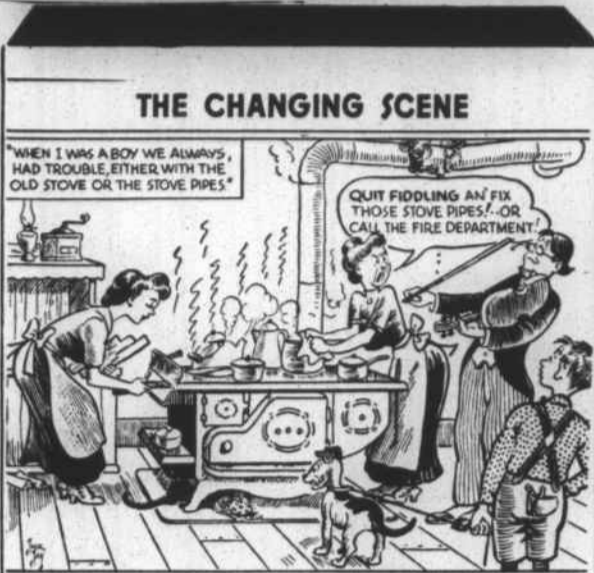

You And Your Insurance

Burglaries Can Be Fought By Simple Precautions

Burglars, for the most part, are not a very imaginative lot -- but they are hard working. According to the Federal Bureau of Investigation someone is committing a burglary every 46 seconds. Whether the light fingered thief is at work at your door, will depend upon one person -- you.

Most home burglaries are undertaken by amateurs with the unwitting help of the home owner. The amateur is usually a youngster and his "take" is often small but your chances of getting it back are smaller. The professional constitutes but a fraction of the house breaking contingent. His take, however, is disproportionately high.

Both the amateur and the professional look for one thing -- an unoccupied house. If you plan to spend the day away from home don't advertise your intentions. Tightly drawn shades, notes to the milk man or delivery boy and battened down windows are a dead give-away to the inexperienced house breaker.

A night on the town may serve as an open invitation to a marauding thief. Keep a few lights lit. There is no sense advertising your absence.

Of course, even the most careful precautions do not always work. One larcenous soul sent tickets to a hit show an anonymous gift, to his prospective victims, and ransacked the house while his "guests" were at the theater. While the professional may employ this type of dodge, the amateur is far less imaginative. He will smash a window, force a lock or jimmy a door. Heavy screening, double locks and an L shaped metal door sash inserted opposite the lock make forced entries more difficult.

Where efforts to keep the burglar from your door fail the next step is to be ready to help the police solve the crime, apprehend the criminal,

and recover your stolen valuables. The FBI reminds us that only 30 per cent of burglaries are solved and only 13 per cent of the stolen property is recovered.

The Insurance Information Institute advises keeping a record of serial numbers and detailed description of all valuables. Large amounts of cash or jewelry should be kept in adequate safes.

When a break is discovered the police should be called in immediately and your insurance agent should be contacted.

Insurance rates vary in try and from city to suburb in the same state. Each \$1,000 of burglary insurance costs from \$1.50 to \$12.00, depending on the amount and type of coverage. Burglary insurance is included in the protection afforded by homeowners' policies, which combine several forms of coverage in one policy.
