In an effort to improve community-school relations in the Prospect School area, concerned administrators, teachers and parents met for a combination PTA and Open House on Monday night.

The meeting was chaired by PTA President, Gurney Hunt. Devotion was by Rev. Bobby Dean Locklear. In the absence of the secretary, Mrs. Shelton Bullard, Mrs. Aggie Deese, guidance counselor, served as recording secretary.

The group heard a report on Prospect's promotion and retention policy which has been revised in conjunction with the county policy. Mrs. Lillian Harris, teacher, and Mr. Herbert Moore, parent, both members of the volunteer program sponsored by the Community Schools Program, spoke on the necessity of parental involvement in schools.

Archie Oxendine, project director of the Robeson County Community Schools Program, issued a challenge to the community to volunteer 15 minutes a day to listen to a child read. He also encouraged the utilization of school facilities.

Mr. James H. Locklear, chairman of the retention and promotion committee reported to the group on that policy. He also answered various questions and encouraged parents to become familiar with the skills required in each grade level before a child will be promoted.

On motion by Dorothy Lowry, parent, the Prospect PTA will meet monthly, the first Monday night in the month, beginning the first Monday night in March.

Carnell Locklear, Advisory Council member, asked that a report be given on a fund-raising project. Mr. Shelton Bullard, chairman of that project, reported that \$407 was collected and turned over to the principal, Mr. James A. Jones.
