

PSU GOLF SEASON OPENS AT ST. ANDREWS MARCH 4

"If we play to our potential, we could be a contender in golf in 1982," stated an optimistic golf coach Lacey Gane at PSU.

And he has plenty of reasons to be optimistic as the Braves have four seniors, one junior, two sophomores, and four freshmen on the 1982

"Our bottom four players will be the key to our season," continued Coach Gane. "Our four seniors will certainly be in the line up and this is their year to do well. There could be a diamond in the rough."

Leading the linksters will be seniors Chuck Curvin of Salemburg and Ken Beckness of Greensboro. Also returnees for the Braves include Dan Baker of Elizabethtown and William Lowry of Pem-Junior Jerry Owen, a for-

mer military personnel, from Lumberton should help the cause. Freshman Chris McDuffie of Raeford and returnee Sophomore Barry Watkins of Durham will add

"We feel we have the experience and potential to be the greatest track team we have ever had at PSU," commented Pembroke State Coach Larry Rodgers, in his first year at the helm.

"The team has six goals set for 1982," added Coach Rodgers. He stated they were: (1) win the NAIA District 26 Championship; (2) Win the Carolinas Conference Championship; (3) Win the NAIA National Championship; (4) Finish among the top 10 in the NCAA II; (5) Have at least three National Champions; (6) Have several athletes obtain All-American.

Let's take a look at the Braves at each event:

Sprints-The sprinters are led by junior Ken McMillan of Fayetteville and junior Ben Major also of Fayetteville. Other sprinters include junior James Brown of Pembroke and freshman Ken Guion of

Hurdles-Leading the pack is All- American Carl Powell of Elizabeth City. Others in the hurdles will include senior Tony Reid of Charlotte, junior Darick Bradley of Southern Pines, and Ken Guion.

"The hurdles should provide a lot of excitement in that Carl Powell has the potential to be one of the top intermediate hurdlers in the nation." added PSU Coach Rodgers. Also Tony Reid adds quality depth back from his injury of last year..."

Jumps-The jumps are led by All- Americans Julius Meekins and senior Charles Swindell of Bew Bern. Meekins has already established a new indoor long jump record (24'10") and Swindell has already jumped over 50 feet in the triple jump.




