

Governor Jim Hunt recently announced his appointments to the Governor's **Advisory Committee on Education Block** Grants, designating Rep. Ed Holmes of Pittsboro, attorney for the Chatham County. School Board, to serve as chairman of the committee.

The Committee will advise the State Board of Education on the allocation of federal block grant funds reserved for state use and on the formula for allocation of funds to local school systems. It will also advise the board on, the planning, development and evalua-tion of state programs that receive block grant funds.

Federal legislation establishing the education block grant program requires an advisory committee, appointed by the Governor.

Dr. Jim Chavis of Pembroke, vice chancellor for student affairs, at Pembroke State University has been named a member. He is a member of the State loard of Education,
