To work at N.C. State

Jacqueline Locklear, a senior at South Robeson High School, has been selected to work at the North Carolina State University School of Veterinary Medicine this summer in the Minority High School Student Apprentice Program.

Ms. Locklear, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John H. Locklear of Route 2, and three other North Carolina high school students were chosen on the basis of their academic skills and their talent and interest in biomedical science.

The students will work in the veterinary school, its laboratories and field facilities. They will also visit areas related to veterinary science, such as diagnostic laboratories and hatcheries.

The apprenticeship, designed to give outstanding minority high school students exposure to the veterinary profession, is sponsored by a grant from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Public Health Service.

Water Supervisor Speaks to Kiwanians

Mr. Grady Chavis, Administrative Supervisor of the Robeson County Water System, spoke at the Tuesday evening Pembroke Kiwanis meeting at the Town and Country Restaurant. Kiwanian Lankford Godwin introduced the guest speaker.

Mr. Chavis, using a county map, described phase I of the water system begun in December 1980. An 8 million dollar bond referendum started the program. 1.5 million of the amount comes from the EDA and 3.5 million comes from the FmHA. The Campbell Soup Company uses approximately 3.2 gallons of water a day in maximum production. There is an average of 15 homes per mile who signed up for the county water line. Approximately 60% of the water of Robeson County is treated. Twenty-five dollars is the cost of tying in on the water line. There are approximately 3,680 customers on the water lines of Robeson County.

Presiding at the meeting was Club President John L. Carter. Invocation was given by Ed Teets and Lankford Godwin led the singing.
