Camera/Recorder Video Unit
A single ultra small video camera and video recorder combination as easy to handle and operate as a standard super eight movie camera? One that will make two-hour video cassettes for home use? It's not only possible but it's coming soon.



Compared with a super 8 movie camera which films for 3 minutes, this single unit micro video system, developed by Matsushita Electric, can record up to 2 hours on a small video cassette. The tape can be seen without waiting for processing and unlike film, the tape can be used over and over.

For the television industry—and TV viewers, there's equally exciting news: an ENG (electronic news gathering) system that will combine a video camera and a video tape recorder in a single, hand-held unit, needing only one person as an operator.

The ENG system, according to Matsushita, will offer broadcast quality color in addition to its compact single unit size which will mean better and faster news for the public, more dramas and documentaries produced on location and future development of video cassettes and disc software.
