\$5,304,000 to the county's income Of this total, \$2,281, 000 was from nonfarm production while slightly over \$3 million originated from forestry plots on farms throughout the county. These figures placed forestry income as the fifth most significant producer of agricultural income surpassed only by tobacco, corn, soybeans and hogs.

A major push has been underway for the last few years regarding forestry improvement programs. The Forestry Service, ASCS, SCS, Agricultural Extension Service, and private forestry companies have all been actively engaged in promoting improved forestry practices. 
