The Lumbee Indians from Detroit, Michigan dominated the Dance Competition at the 1982 Homecoming Pow Wow held Saturday, July 3, beginning at 6 p.m., at Pembroke Senior High School's ballpark.

Although Michael Nelson won first place in the boys' category in the 12 years and under age group, Robert Urban from Detroit, Michigan came in second. Among the girls, 12 years and under, Tinilea Urban, also from Detroit, Mich. won first place while Shannon Nichol Dunn from Pembroke took second.

In the boys' category, 13 to 16 years of age, Mark Locklear of Charlotte won first place and Richard Locklear of Detroit, Mich., second. Among the girls in the same age bracket, Desiree Sanderson from Detroit, Mich. won first place and Beverly Blue, second.

Elaine Flemming won first place in the women's category. Barbara Locklear came in second. Bob Winfree from Charlotte won first place in the men's category while Mike Wilkins of Pembroke came in second.

Said a spokesperson for the Pow Wow Committee: "The Lumbee Homecoming Pow Wow was a great success. The enthusiasm of the crowd seemed to inspire and incite the performers, ultimately putting on a magnificent dance contest."

An estimated 800-1,000 persons viewed the festivities that included a dance contest, an archery contest, arts and crafts booths, and much more. This year's Pow Wow was co-sponsored by Lumbee Regional Development Association, the Prospect Jaycees and the Robeson County Indian Caucus.

Participants will receive a monthly stipend of \$555, payment for the required tuition and fees, and all other reasonable educational expenses; books, travel, and other necessary educational expenses.

All students applied through the Lumbee Regional Development Association Talent Search Program. The Director of the Talent Search Program, Ms. Belinda Scott Harris, is also the Indian Health Service Coordinator. The applications were accepted in the LRDA office and then mailed to the Indian Health Service office for selection. Criteria for selection included academic performance, work experience and community background, faculty recommendation, stated reasons for asking for the scholarship, and how their desired career goals related to Indian health manpower needs, based on current needs of Indian people.
