LRDA's Lumbee River Native American Center for the Arts was established to provide gifted and talented Indian students culturally enriching learning experiences

in various fields of the cultural arts. And, indeed, the Center for the Arts has enjoyed more than a modicum of success. A number of Center for the Arts students have excelled in the cultural arts field this year.

For example, Layton Chavis, a 1982 graduate of Pembroke Senior High, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Chavis, Jr. of Pembroke. He finished in the top 5 in stiff competition state-wide for the N.C. Music Educator's Scholarship. In addition to this monumental accomplishment, Layton is one of 3 students from the Center for the Arts awarded PSU's Theatre Arts Scholarship.

The other 2 recipients of PSU's Theatre Arts Scholarship were Norma Lowry and Kenny Hunt. Norma, a 1982 graduate of Pembroke Senior High School, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Lowry. Kenny, a 1982 graduate of Fairmont High School, is the son of Ms. Priscilla Hunt, of Fairmont. All three

recipients were enrolled at LRDA's Center for the Arts for a period of two years.

Another student excelling in the cultural arts field is Jamie Locklear: A rising senior at Magnolia High School and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil B. Locklear of Magnolia. Jamie is currently attending the N.C. School of the Arts in Winston-Salem. He is enrolled in the summer program in the area of drama. He also attended LRDA's Center for the Arts for two years.

Three Center for the Arts students in the Visual Arts field attended the Gifted and Talented Program at Brevard College this summer. Belvia Spaulding, the daughter of Ms. Libby Spaulding of Rowland and a rising junior at South Robeson High School, attended the two-week program. So did Terry Lowry, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Neal Lowry of Red Springs who is a rising junior at Prospect High School. And Eric Hunt, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Rudolph Hunt of Lumberton, who is a rising junior at South Robeson High School.

There are many more success stories at LRDA's Lumbee River Native American Center for the Arts which is funded through the Office of Indian Education, Title IV,

Part II, in Washington, D.C. Too many, in fact, to mention here. Suffice it to say the Center for the Arts offers instruction to gifted and talented Indian students in the areas of music, dance, visual arts, drama, speech, and creative writing. And as the above success stories prove, the program has proved to be tremendously successful in its endeavor to bring culture to this area.

## Demos for Johnson Launched

Fayetteville-Tom Gibson, recent primary challenger of 7th District Congressman Charlie Rose, today in a news conference in downtown Fayetteville, announced the formation of Democrats for Johnson Committee.

Republican Ed Johnson of Lumberton is seeking to unseat Rose in the November election.

Gibson charged that Rose "is too liberal for the 7th District." When Charlie Rose is visiting in the 7th District, Gibson said, "he talks like President Reagan." But in Washington, "he votes like Tip O'Neill and Ted Kennedy."

Gibson, who will serve as Chairman of the committee, explained: "I have taken this position in an attempt to rally Democratic support behind Ed Johnson."

In citing Rose's voting record in Congress, Gibson accused Rose of voting "to deny his constituents a 25% income tax cut," while voting himself a "\$525.00 per week personal tax deduction."

Gibson also said Rose "put his political career ahead of every tobacco farmer in his district," and supported "New York City union bosses more than twice as often as the businesses in his district."

According to Gibson, Rose "leads his state delegation in absentee votes and tax paid junkets all over the world," and is guilty of voting "to bail out New York City, the Chrysler Corporation, and even the Russian shipping industry while his district has had a 33% higher unemployment rate than the rest of the state" during his ten years in Washington.
